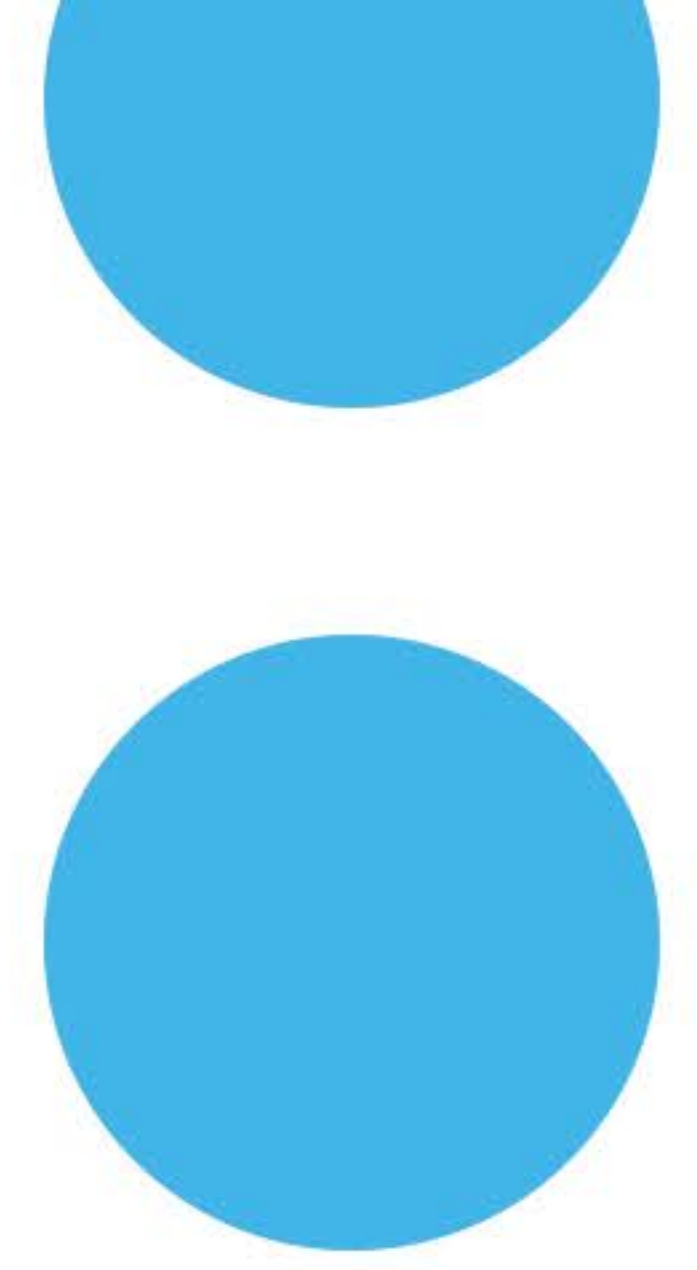

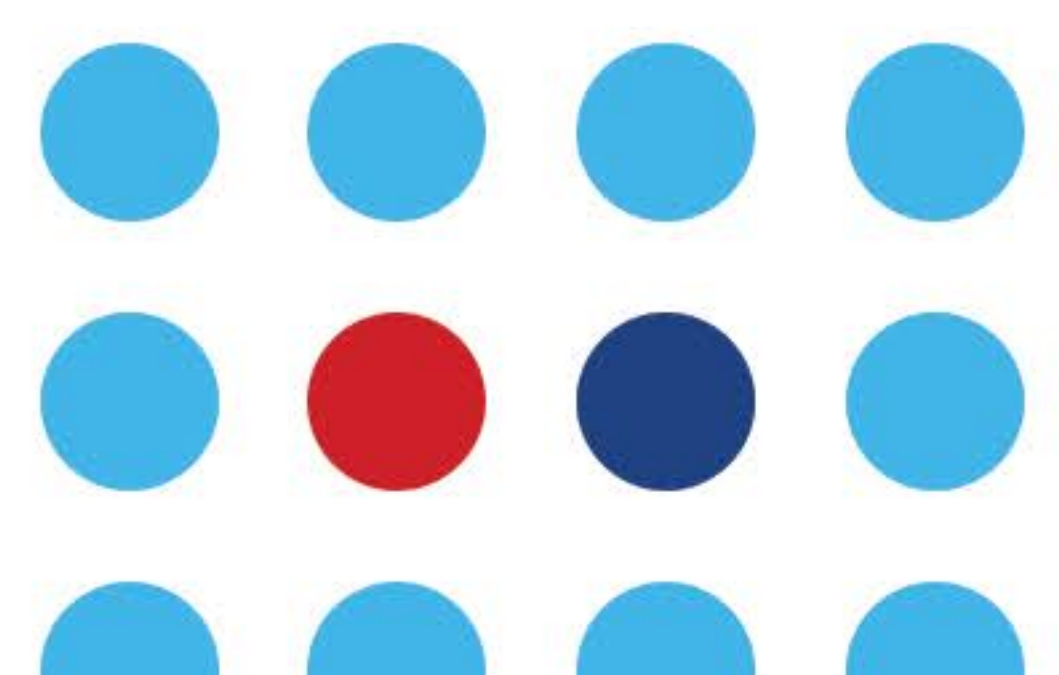

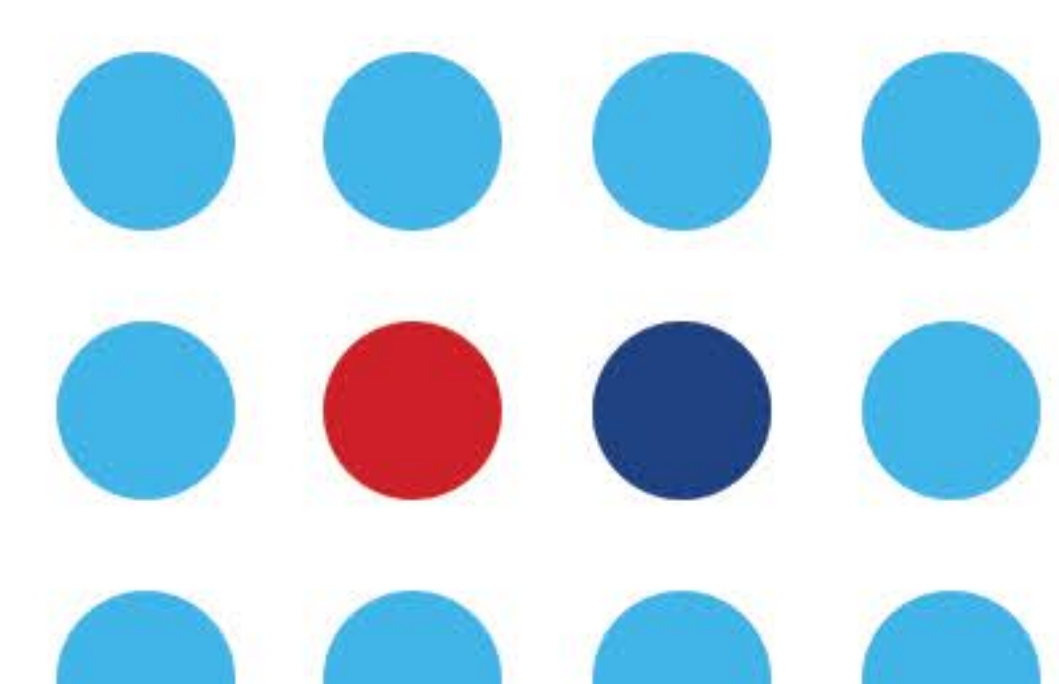

About the Indonesia-Korea NSP Young Professionals Lab

The Indonesia-Korea New Southern Policy Young Professionals Lab is a comprehensive program that specifically seeks to promote, incentivize, and increase the number of policy briefs on the Republic of Korea (ROK)'s New Southern Policy (NSP). This program is designed for the Indonesian young professional community—emerging young academicians, researchers, experts, and policymakers. The main structure of the program is a Lab that works as a dynamic platform that creates and nurtures an environment for stimulating discussions, exploration of various ROK-ASEAN and ROK- Indonesia issues, and formulation of research questions and regional issue focuses possible to take place. The two-day program consists of panel discussions and workshops that ultimately lead to the creation of a joint policy recommendation.



Ten young rising Indonesian professionals participated in the two-day program in Jakarta to conceptualize policy recommendations that address both challenges and opportunities that lie behind the Indonesian perspective and efforts in realizing the goals of NSP, and their proposed solutions to enhance implementation of NSP specifically in Indonesia.

Executive Director, ASEAN Youth Organization

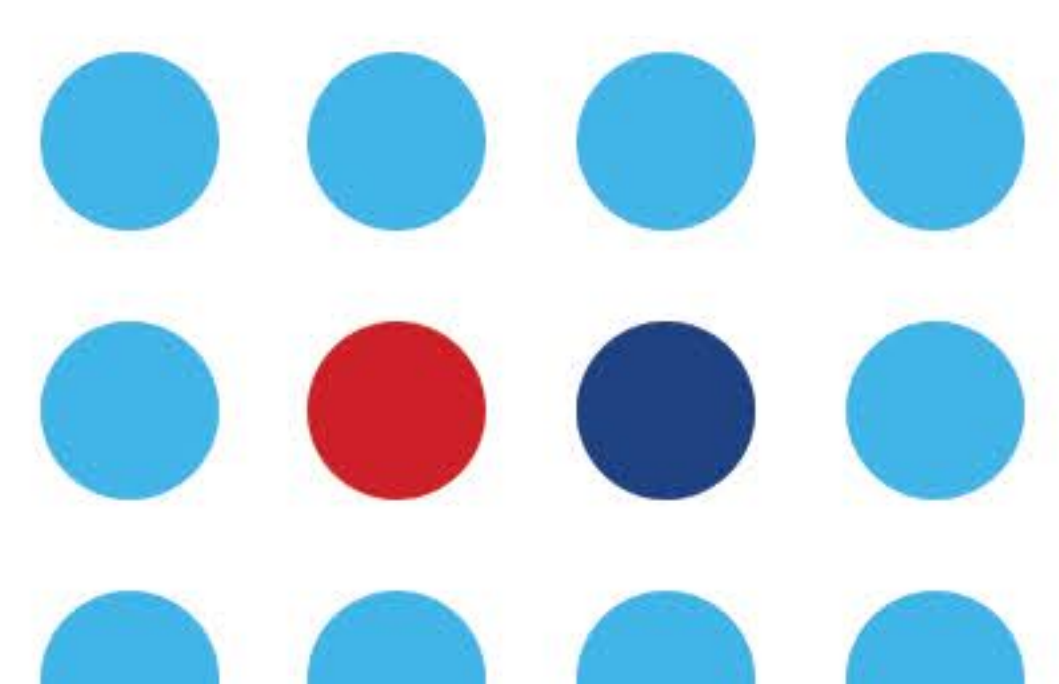

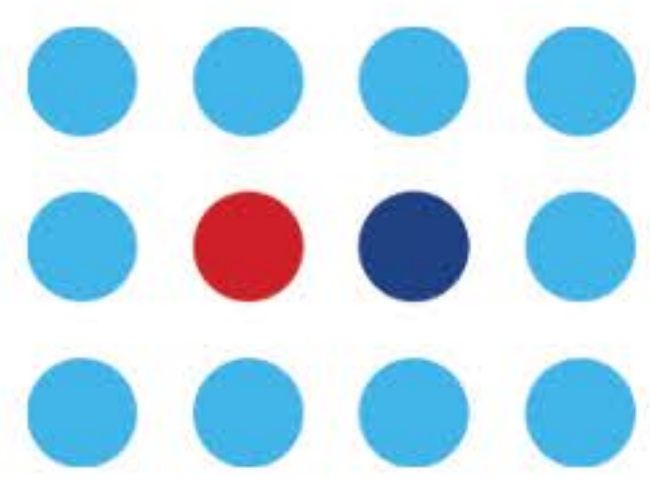


Amalia Mastur

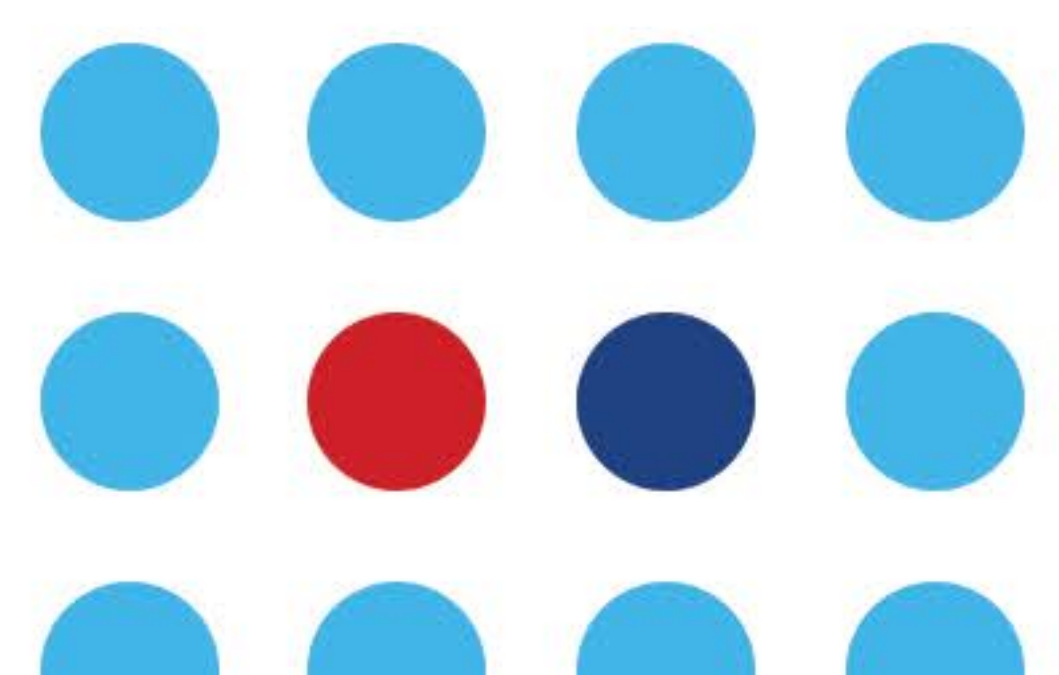
Aristyo Rizka Darmawan
Lecturer, University of Indonesia

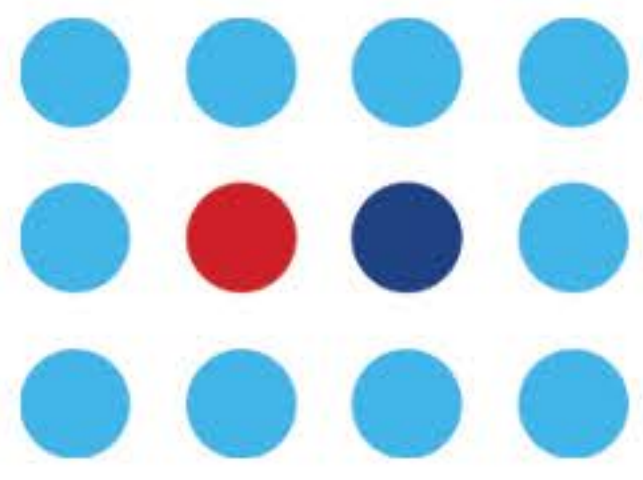

Head Delegation of Indonesia, W20

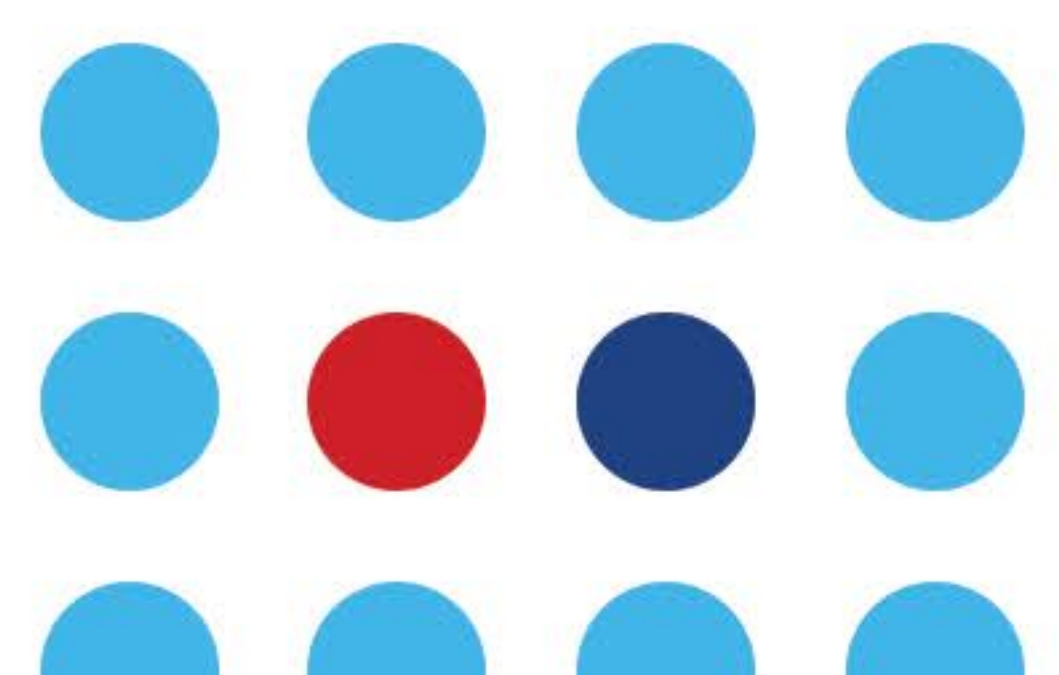

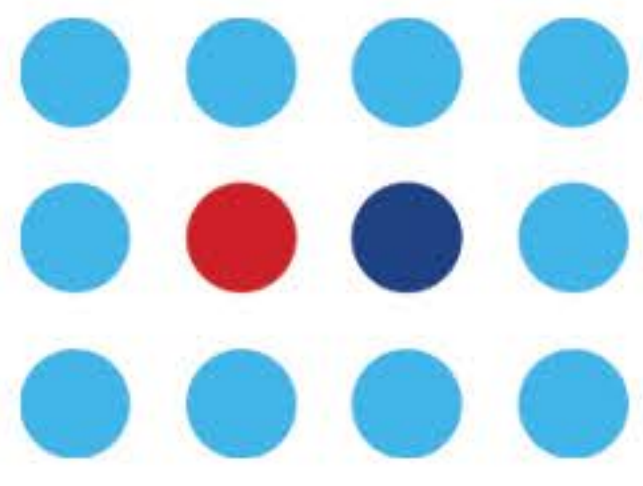


Nadia Caroline

Research Coordinator, Institute for Essential Services Reform

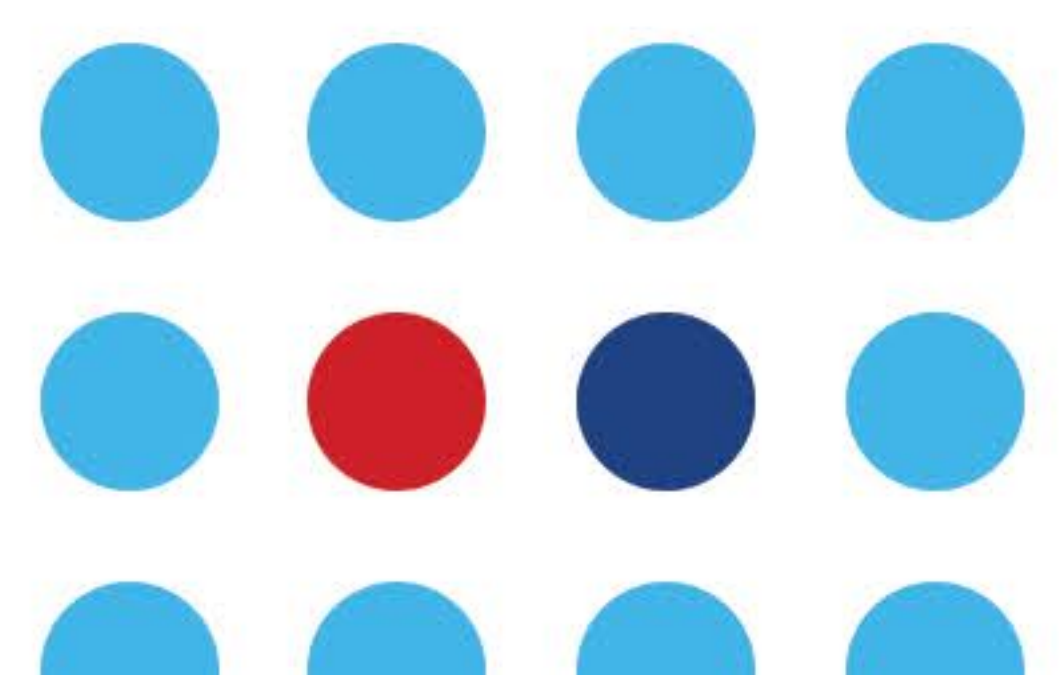

Associate, MicroSave Consulting

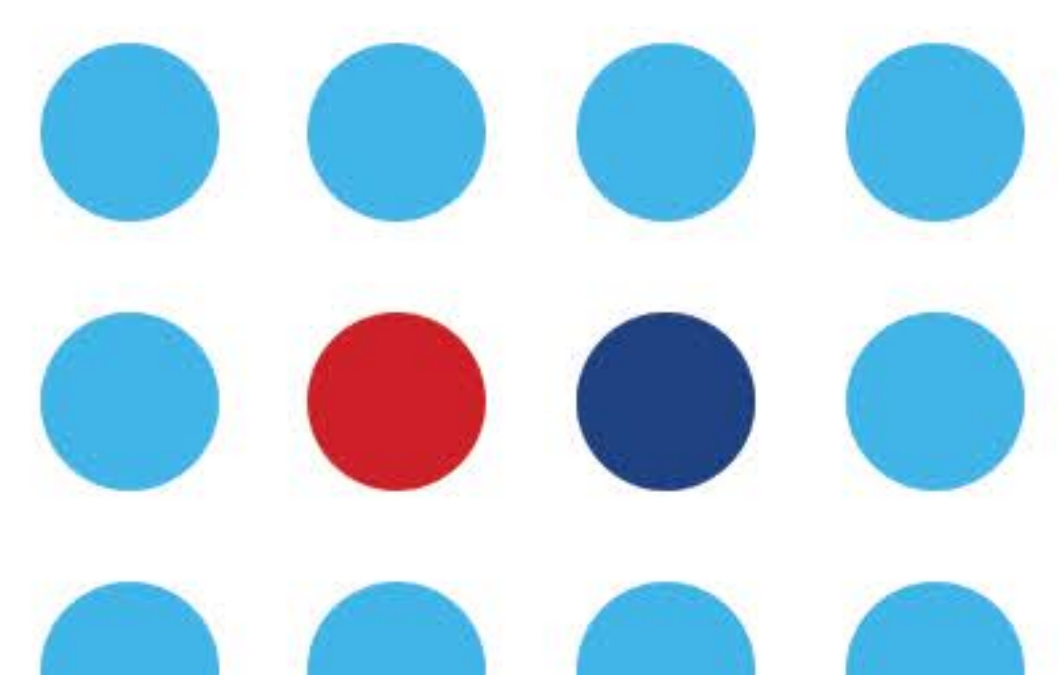

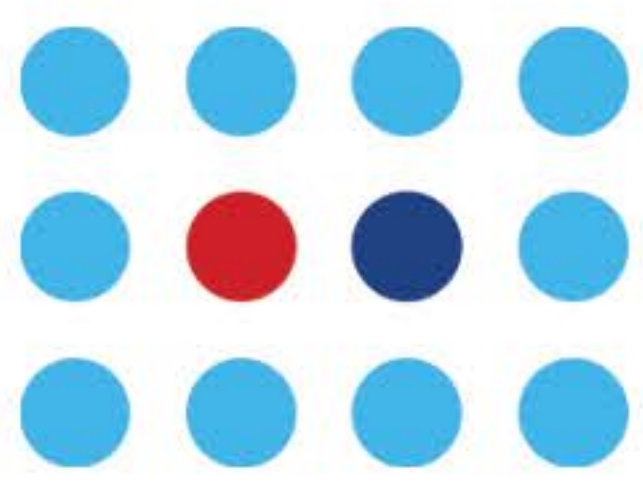


Opening Ceremony

“Indonesia and ROK are middle powers which have much more room and are more versatile to interact with each other. Indonesia and ROK do not have any political baggage nor bad history. The ROK may have some with other countries, and Indonesia too, but not between the two countries. Therefore, it creates more free and open space to work in.”

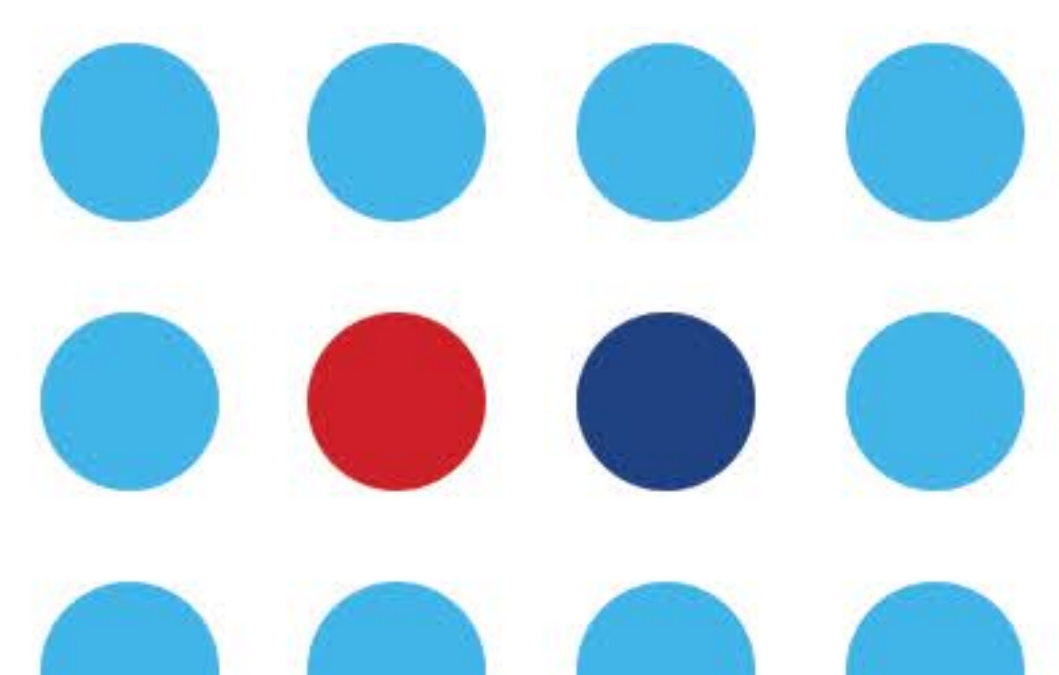

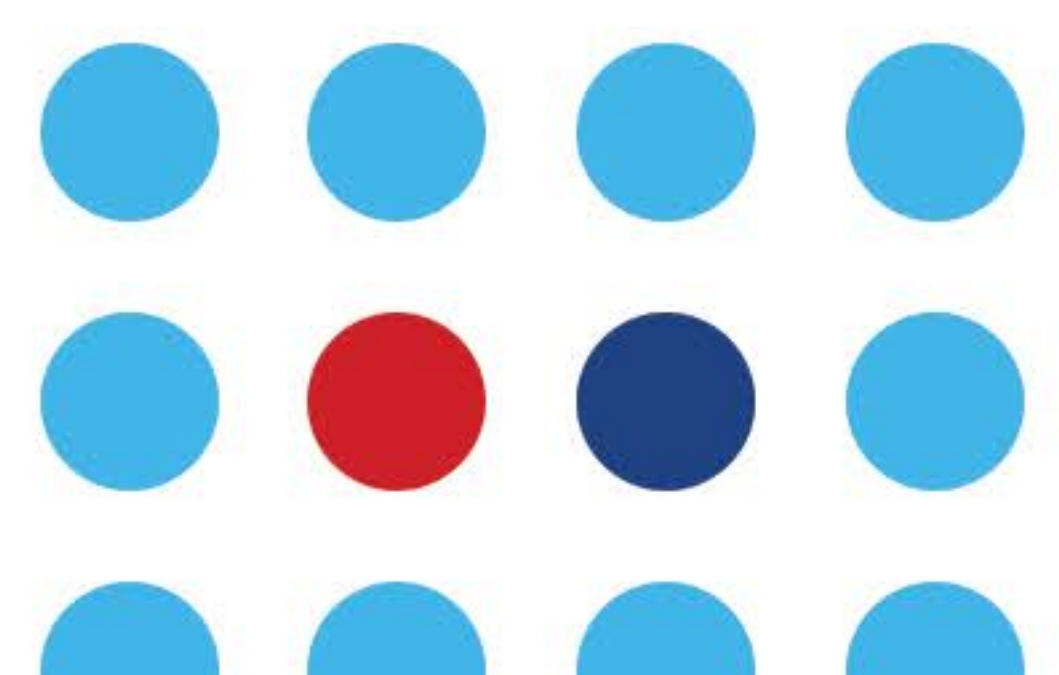

Workshop on the New Southern Policy



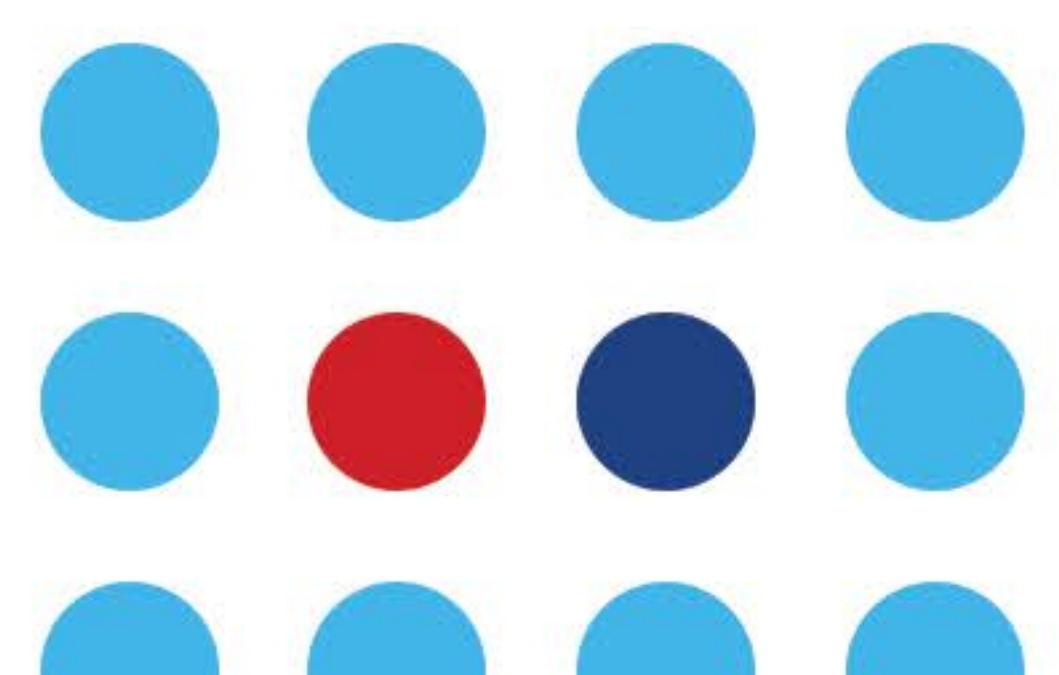
The Lab continued with the Workshop on New Southern Policy by H.E. Lim Sungnam, Ambassador of the Republic of Korea to ASEAN, and Mr. Lee Dong-Gy, Deputy Director-General of the Presidential Committee on the New Southern Policy who shared the conceptual definition and practical framework of the NSP and NSP+ to the participants.



“Of all the 10 members, Indonesia is a very influential diplomatic partner for Korea. NSP is more or less an umbrella, foundational policy for bilateral relationships with ASEAN countries. One of the biggest challenges in the implementation of NSP will be the COVID-19. But despite that, Korea and ASEAN have done really well.”



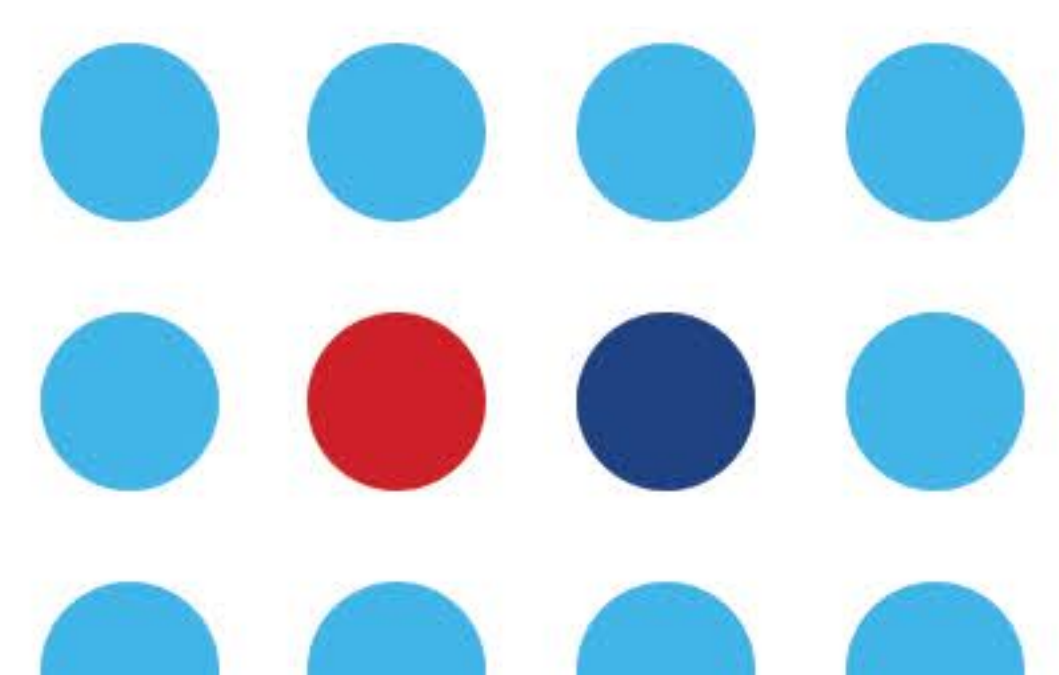
“The NSP Plus is now intended to strengthen the implementation of the peace and cooperative projects. In relation to the ASEAN-Korea relations, people-centered means that we should put people first in our relations. This is in line with ASEAN’s people-oriented community. ASEAN also has a big role in the establishment of peace including in the process of peace on the Korean Peninsula.”



Focus Group Discussion with Indonesian Officials



The Workshop on the New Southern Policy was followed by a Focus Group Discussion with Indonesian Officials and Experts featuring H.E. Thomas Lembong, Minister of Trade of Republic of Indonesia (2015-2016); H.E. Abdul Kadir Jailani, Director-General of the Asia Pacific and Africa, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Republic of Indonesia; Prof. Bondan Tiara Sofyan, Director-General of Defence Potentials, Ministry of Defence of Republic of Indonesia (2018-2020).





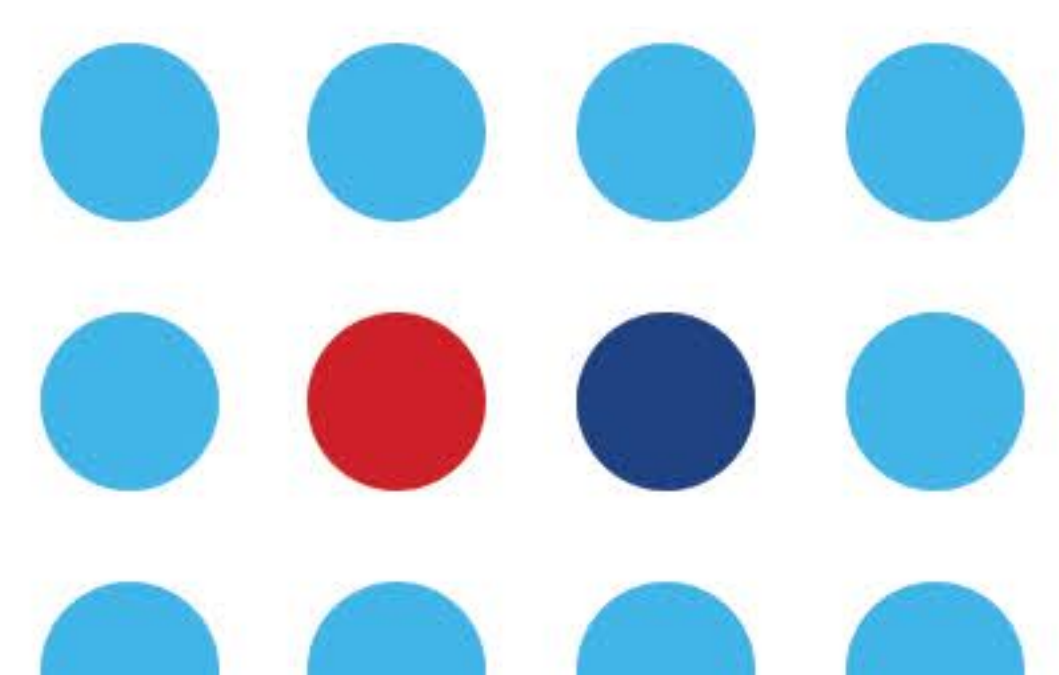
“There is a strong signal and bright light showing the incredible positive nature of the relationship between Indonesia and Korea. Indonesia-Korea CEPA would enable us to consider potential difficulties or issues/concerns. The challenges (but also opportunities) are gigantic. The COVID-19 pandemic we are experiencing right now is just an appetizer; a small case of things to come. There are two more challenges that would drive the course COVID-19 has led: first, climate change is going to infiltrate and flavor every foreign policy issue. The other one is the US-China issue.”



“The engagement of Indonesia to NSP will also demonstrate strategic interest. This becomes increasingly important, including to the ASEAN Outlook on the Indo-Pacific. Indonesia also has parallel strategic interests in creating regional stability through stable regional mechanisms. Development cooperation is one of the core pillars of the NSP. Many developing countries find ROK as the role model for development. The ROK is a valuable and attractive partner for development.”



“If we can summarize the cooperation in the defense sector, it supports the strategic partnerships, especially NSP. We hope that it (NSP) will not only maintain the national interest but also keep regional safety and security. Strategic cooperation takes a long time. There are still many opportunities to explore.”



Before the Q&A session with the young professionals starts, Mr. Bok Dug-gyou, Director of Indonesia – Korea Business Cooperation Center, Korean Trade-Investment Promotion Agency (KOTRA) Jakarta, and Mr. Lee Joo-han, Secretary-General, Korean Chamber of Commerce and Industry (KOCHAM) had a chance to respond to the panel.



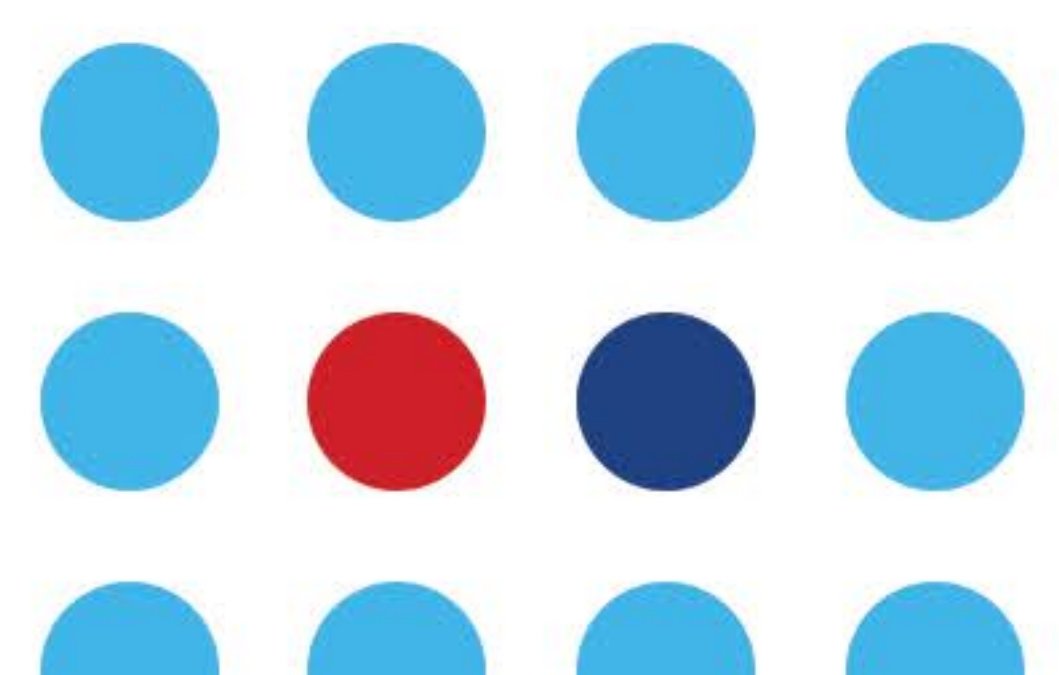
“Indonesia-Korea CEPA should help with to leverage bilateral relations into the kind of cooperation that Vietnam and ROK have now. To reach the level of cooperation with Vietnam, we must promote shipbuilding and automobile investment in Indonesia.”



“After NSP was introduced, many Korean companies from many sectors have aggressively been entering Indonesia. For us, this is very significant, because more advanced technology industries are entering. ROK and Indonesia can work together to improve ICT sectors and also develop more smart panel houses. ROK is very developed in the ICT sector. The leading trend has changed a lot. We see that the change of lifestyle, online, and mobile keeps on increasing. Both Indonesia and Korea should use this momentum to increase and improve business transactions and cooperation.”



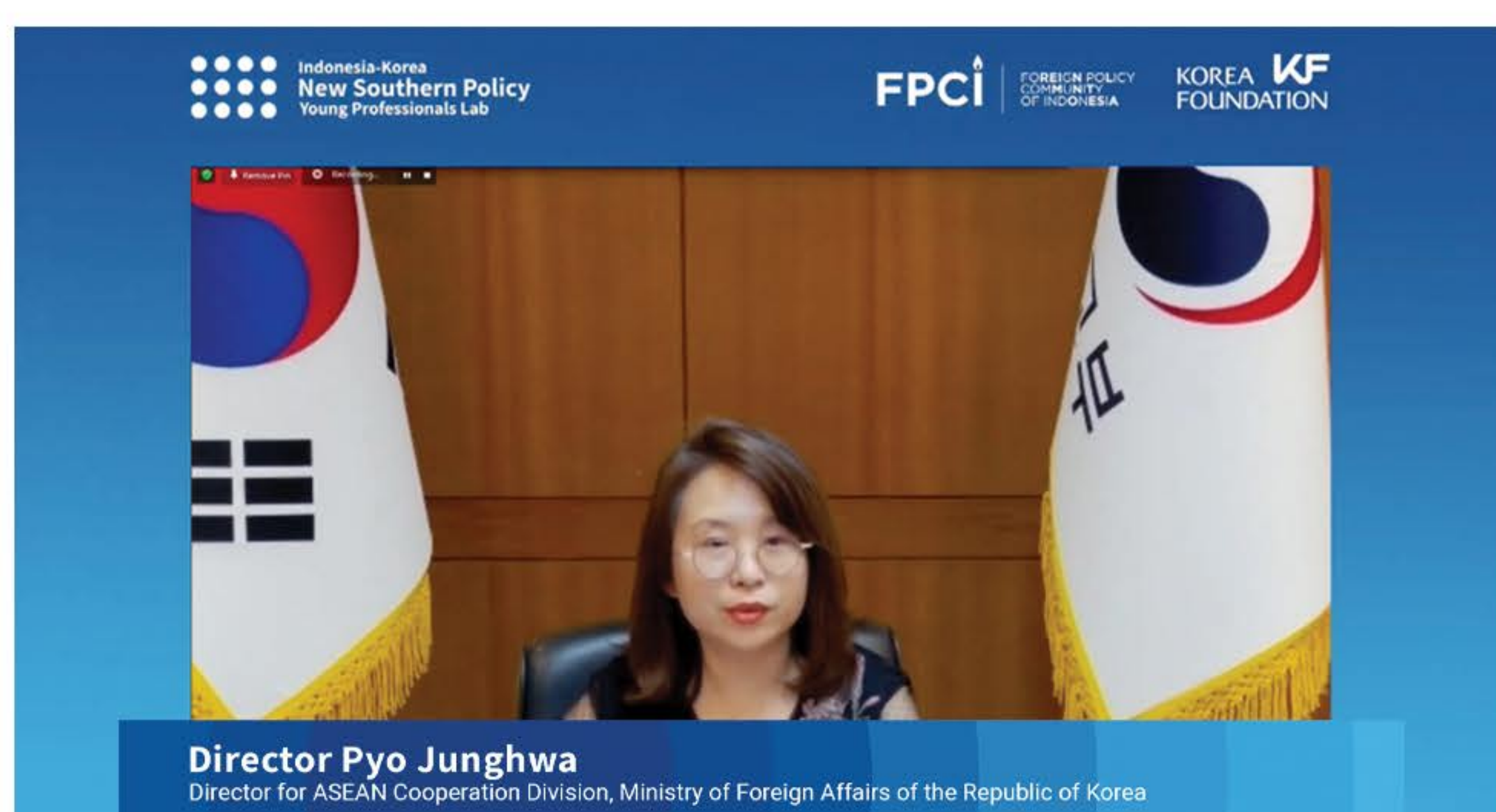
After the end of the FGD session, participants focused on developing their joint policy recommendations for the rest of the day.



Focus Group Discussion with Korean Officials and Experts

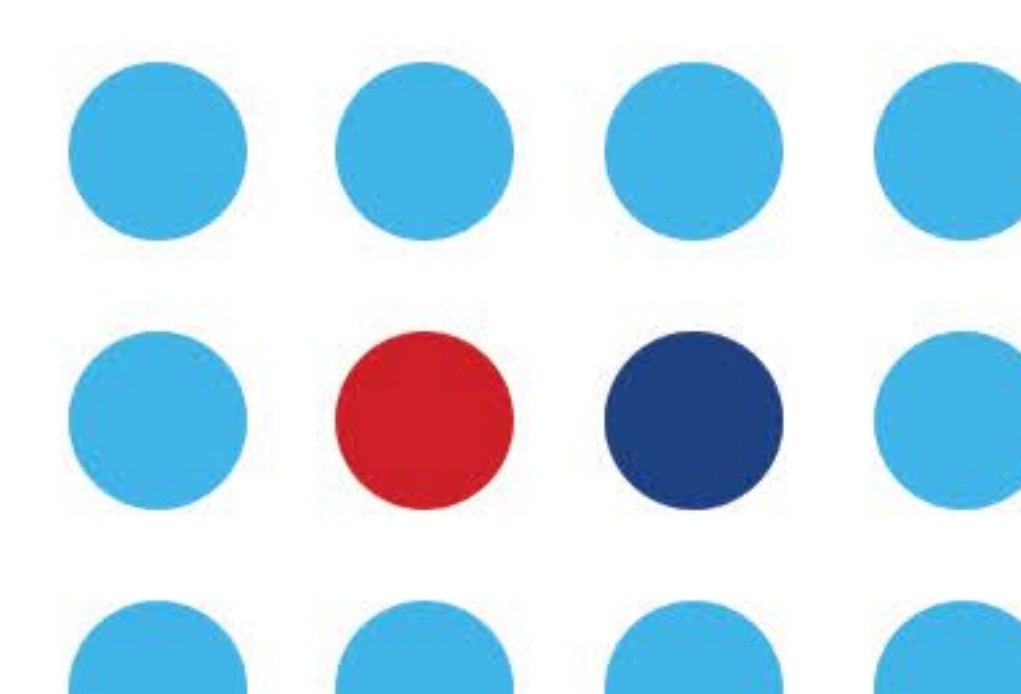


On the second day, the ten young professionals had a chance to participate in a Focus Group Discussion with Korean Officials and Experts. Joining from Seoul were Ms. Pyo Junghwa, Director for ASEAN Cooperation Division, Korean Ministry of Foreign Affairs; H.E. Kim Chang-beom, Ambassador of the Republic of Korea to Indonesia (2018-2020); Ms. Siti Maisarah Haji Majid, Deputy Head of Information and Data Unit, ASEAN-Korea Centre; Dr. Kwak Sungil, Research Fellow, Korea Institute for Economic Policy; and Dr. Lee Jaehyon, Senior Fellow, Asan Institute for Policy Studies.



“The NSP+ announced last year is an updated version of the NSP with seven initiatives while maintaining the three pillars. Since this announcement, MOFA and other ministries have identified key projects. MOFA is implementing five flagship programs for NSP countries such as Inclusive Rural Development, Digital Partnership for Inclusive Development, Inclusive Transportation for Balanced Growth, Higher Education for Prosperous Future, and Smart Cities for People and Planet. ROK appreciates ASEAN’s warm reception on NSP and NSP Plus, as it is included in last year’s summit. Despite these achievements, there is still more room for closer ties.”

“NSP is an initiative that is more like a guiding light for policy practitioners to coordinate with each other and come up with consistent policy directions. Institutions are working together with aims and objectives so the policy will be well-aligned and synchronized. Under this NSP as the umbrella framework, each individual, bilateral, and multilateral approach can be combined towards these common principles and objectives. Indonesia is standing at a very important place within ROK’s NSP. In fact, Jakarta is the place where President Moon announced this policy.”





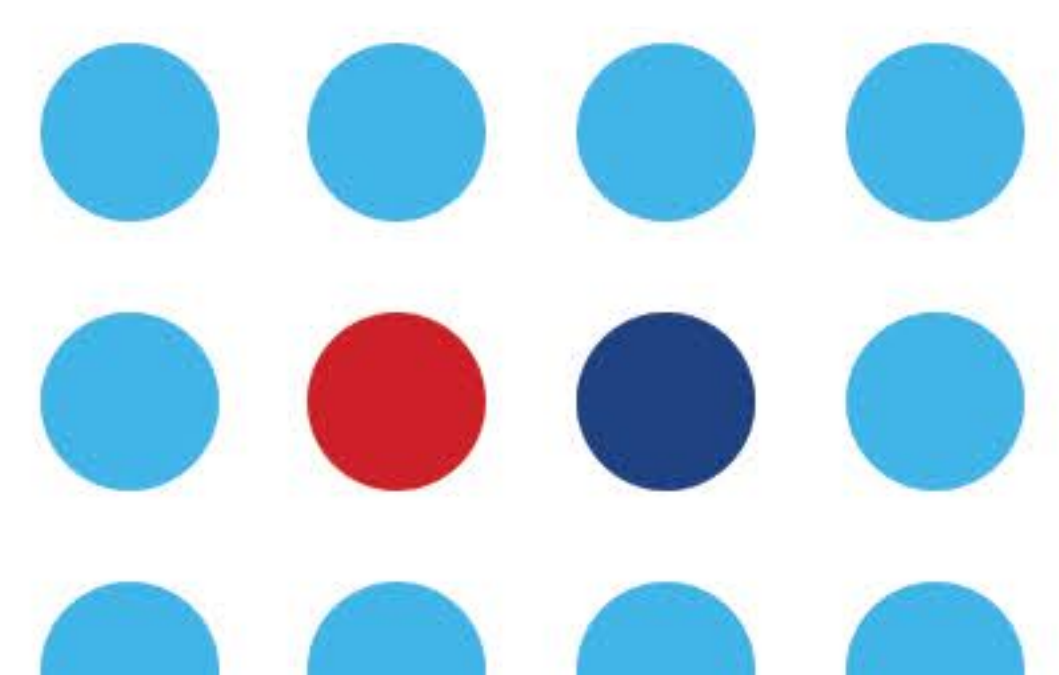
“Engagement with youth as well as academia has become the target. Youth play a crucial role as they will be the next generation leaders that will be pushing the ideas of strong and sustainable ASEAN-ROK partnership. Only with better mutual understanding can youth play a better role. Youth as future leaders therefore can play an important role. For ASEAN, expansion in education and health are sought and aligned with NSP Plus.”



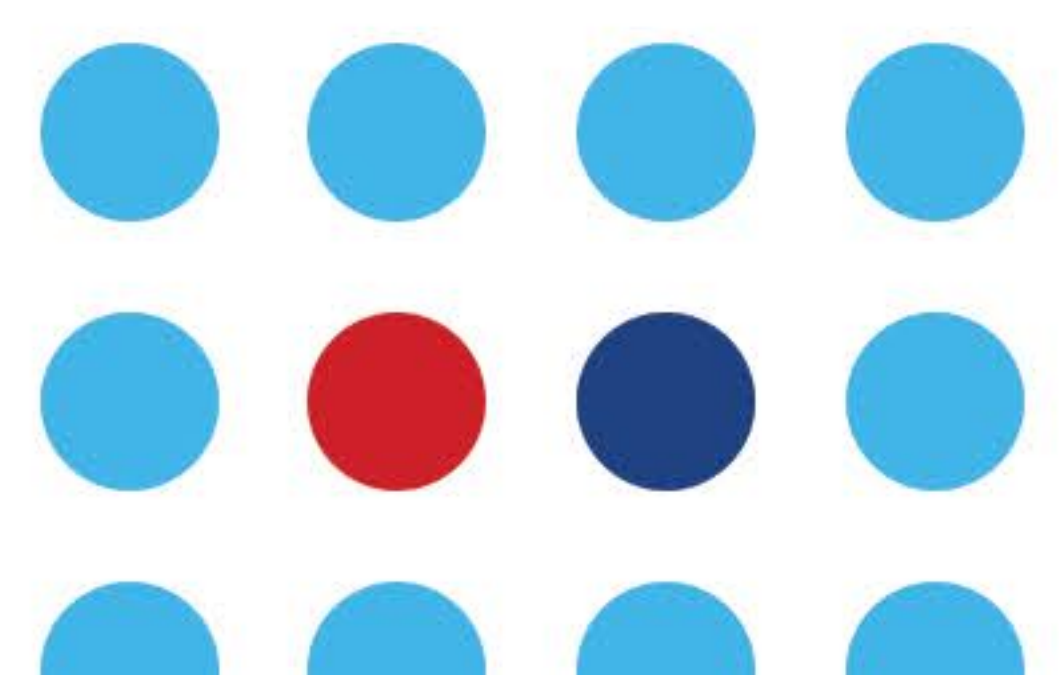
“NSP+ maintains the basic framework of the existing NSP which includes its values and fundamental objectives. To improve its engagement with Indonesia, the ROK can focus on the growth of ICT and healthcare sectors during the pandemic. This is very related to the sixth NSP+ initiative which is 'cooperate in future industries for common prosperity. On the other hand, better utilization of complementary relationships, along with the NSP+ Initiatives will be a driver to sustain the NSP and build a new version of the NSP”



“In regards to achievement and consistency (of NSP), President Moon Jae-in has said it is genuine and sincere. It will be consistent to put ASEAN countries as strategic partners. But the problem is the concrete actions. It is not tangible yet. They have made a great effort, but it takes time to see the result. The ROK is not China, Japan, or the U.S. We have relatively small pockets. It takes time to accumulate all of our efforts.”

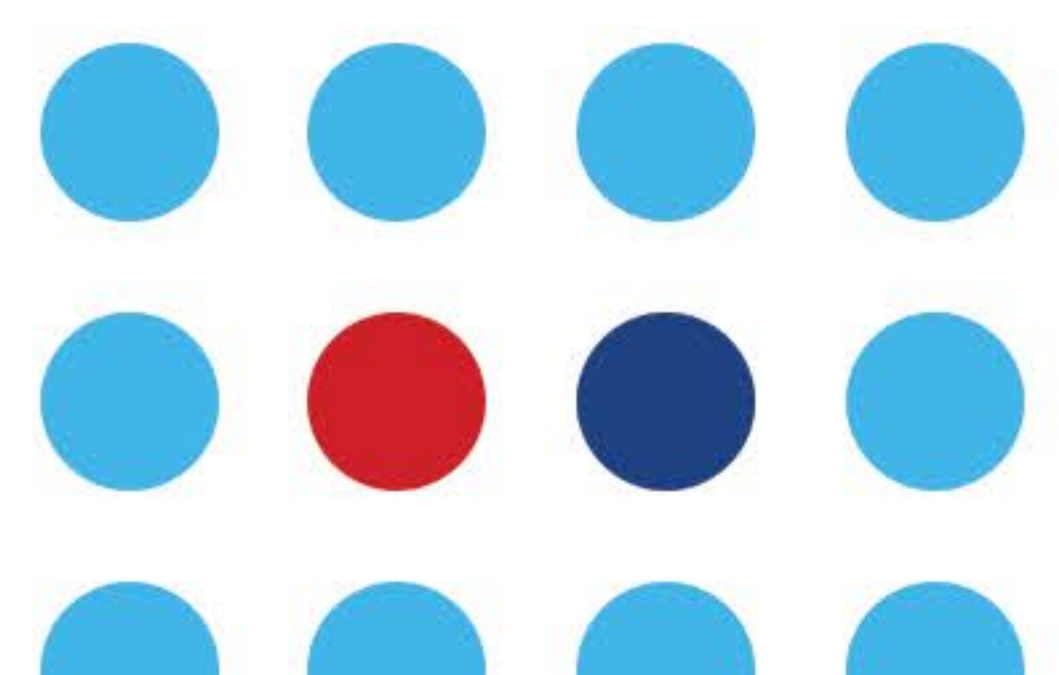

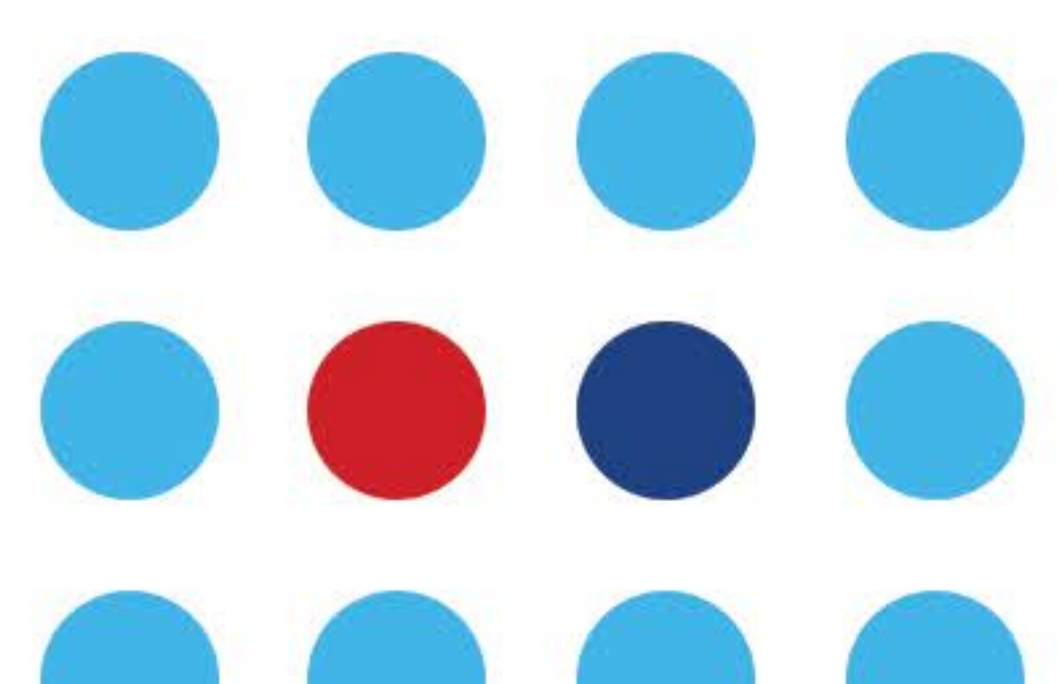
Special Post-Lab Events

Government Briefing and Hand Over of Joint Policy Recommendations
Thursday, 10 June 2021



On Thursday, 10 June 2021, the Indonesia-Korea New Southern Policy Young Professionals Lab delegation visited the Indonesian Ministry of Foreign Affairs to officially hand over and discuss the Joint Policy Recommendations of the policy lab, which was held on 24-25 May 2021. The delegation of ten young rising Indonesian professionals was led by Dr. Dino Patti Djalal, Founder and Chairman of Foreign Policy Community of Indonesia (FPCI), and received by Dr. Santo Darmosumarto, Director of East Asia and Pacific of Indonesian Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

The meeting took place in a less formal setting. The members of the delegation began the discussion by introducing themselves to Dr. Santo Darmosumarto. They then talked about the selection process and their experience during the two-days intensive program. Afterward, Dr. Dino Patti Djalal discussed the main purpose of the program and how the Joint Policy Recommendations created by the 10 Young Professionals may be used as a good reference for the Ministry to produce policies that shall strengthen ties with the Republic of Korea.

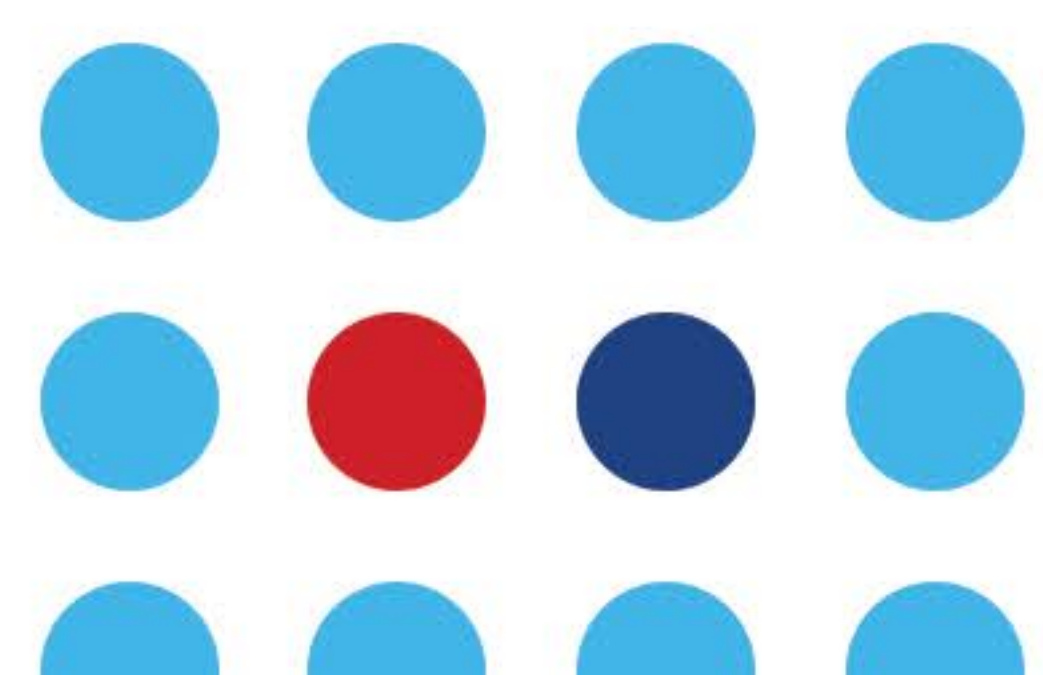




Equilibrium Tampubolon and Angelo Abil Wijaya then explained the Joint Policy Recommendations in detail. In their presentation, they informed that the recommendations are formulated against a backdrop of uncertainties in the international order due to an ongoing strategic rivalry between an established but declining superpower and a rising superpower, as well as the pressing cross-cutting global challenges, including the COVID-19 pandemic, increasing misunderstanding and prejudice among peoples, climate change and unequal digitalization.



Further, the rest of the NSP Young Professionals presented the policy recommendations highlighted under the People, Prosperity, and Peace Pillars. Dr. Santo responded positively to the findings, inputs, and recommendations presented. Dr. Santo suggested a further dialogue between the NSP Young Professionals and Indonesian diplomats. He also encouraged the NSP Young Professionals to be actively involved in strengthening the Indonesia-Korea relations.



Special University Lecture with FPCI Chapters DKI Jakarta Monday, 14 June 2021



On Monday, 14 June 2021, Indonesia-Korea New Southern Policy Young Professionals Lab convened a Special University Lecture with FPCI Chapters DKI Jakarta entitled “Unravelling Paths for a Stronger New Southern Policy (NSP) Implementation After the Pandemic.” The Special University Lecture featured Agatha Lydia Nathania, Yani Parasti Siregar, and I Gusti Bagus Dharma Agastia as the keynote speakers. One hundred and twenty-one students from seven universities in DKI Jakarta registered for the lecture.



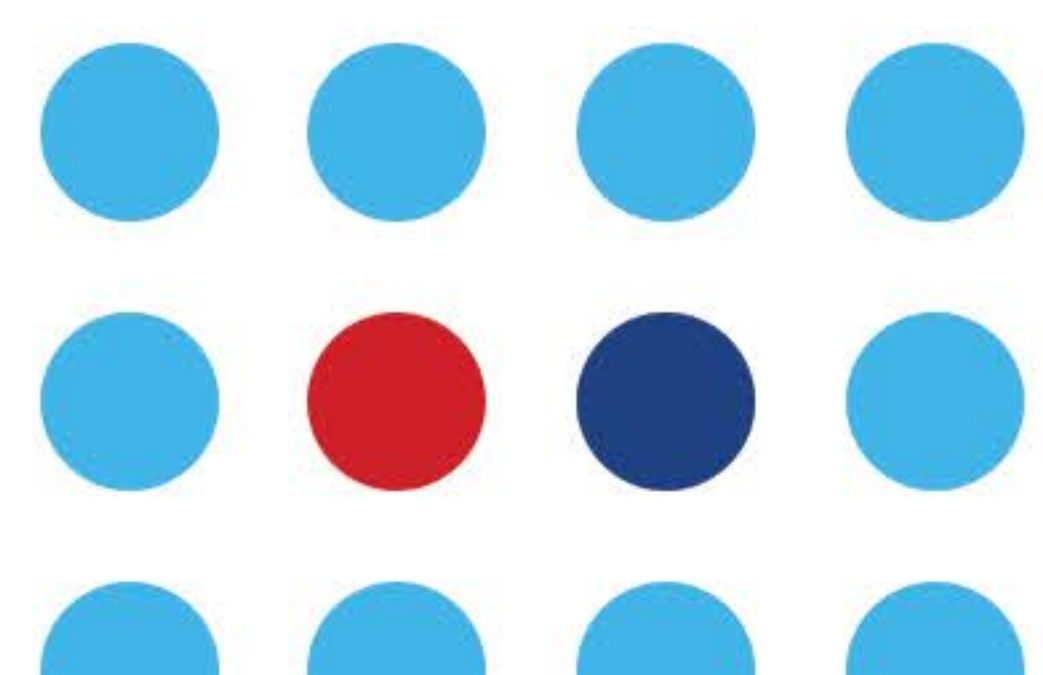
Agatha Lydia Nathania began the forum by briefly explaining the policy lab program and the purpose of the Joint Policy Recommendations they disseminate. She then presented the policy recommendations from the People Pillar, focusing on the healthcare sector, capacity building, and people-to-people interactions. She stated that under the NSP, the two countries should ensure both citizens’ access to healthcare and encourage joint research in said sector to reduce dependency on medical supply. She also suggested an increase in scholarships and training in vocational skills to tackle issues related to youth unemployment. Lastly, she recommended the use of digital platforms to increase people-to-people interactions.



Yani Parasti Siregar then explained the recommendations under Prosperity Pillar. She proposed for the two countries to promote direct trade and investment, particularly in digital technology, clean energy, sustainable agriculture, and a creative economy. These sectors are chosen because digital technology and clean energy is becoming more essential in our daily lives. Meanwhile, sustainable agriculture and creative economy have become the sectors that help many mid to low-income communities, and people in the rural areas survive during the pandemic.



Afterward, Dharma Agastia briefed the students on the recommendations under the Peace Pillar. He proposed that the security cooperation under the NSP should be started through human resources development and focus on the maritime security sector. He also encouraged increased engagements under a framework such as security dialogue at the government-to-government level and the people-to-people level.



**Public Forum and Press Conference
Tuesday, 15 June 2021**



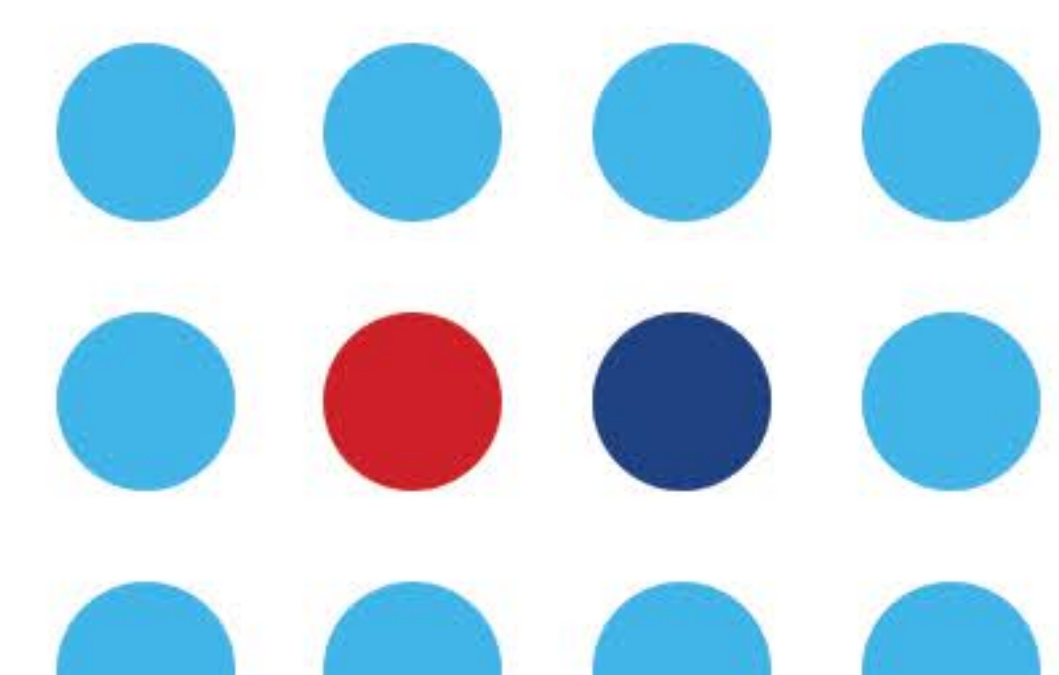
On Tuesday, 15 June 2021, the Foreign Policy Community of Indonesia convened a virtual public forum entitled “New Southern Policy for a Peaceful, Stable and Prosperous ASEAN Region.” The purpose of the public forum is to present the Joint Policy Recommendations and results of the Indonesia-Korea New Southern Policy Young Professionals Lab that was held successfully on 24-25 May 2021. The forum was opened by Dr. Dino Patti Djalal, Founder and Chairman of Foreign Policy Community of Indonesia (FPCI) and followed by the keynote presentation by H.E. Michael Tene, Deputy Secretary-General for ASEAN Political-Security Community, and Prof. Choe Wongi, Head of Center for ASEAN-India Studies, Korea National Diplomatic Academy (KNDA). The forum was moderated by Prof. Dewi Fortuna Anwar, Co-Founder of FPCI.

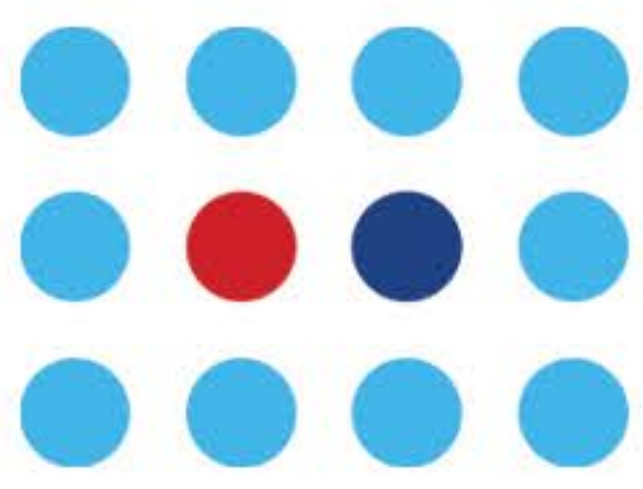


In his remark, Dr. Dino Patti Djalal said that Indonesia and South Korea had developed a strategic partnership. He noted that their relationship is a unique and important one because it is between two middle powers, which are democracies and have the same outlook on regional and global affairs. However, during the implementation, South Korea faced a few criticisms such as lack of focus, not being inclusive enough, and focusing too much on prosperity. In this context, the New Southern Policy Young Professionals Lab is aimed to assess the implementation of the policy and provide recommendations to address such challenges.



H.E. Michael Tene stated that in terms of NSP and regional components, the three pillars of NSP correspond well with ASEAN’s Community Pillars. In terms of peace, the Republic of Korea and ASEAN shared objectives in some hotspots in our region, like Korean Peninsula and the South China Sea. He also noted that the Korean Government has always been a strong supporter of ASEAN centrality and ASEAN Outlook on the Indo-Pacific – the latest regional policy that was issued by ASEAN. In the people-to-people context, since NSP was launched, there is a significant increase in people-to-people and educational exchanges before the pandemic. Korea and ASEAN have been doing mutually beneficial cooperation in terms of promoting prosperity in various sectors.





Prof. Choe Wongi explained the main motivations for the NSP, which are diversification of focus from the Big Four to the ASEAN region; nurturing relations with ASEAN as an important partner to enlarging international support, and corresponding to ASEAN status as the fastest-growing economy. He then presented how the NSP has been evolved to NSP Plus by rearranging the priorities into seven sectors. He also mentioned the areas where the NSP can be further developed, for instance, the security pillar. In his assessment, Korea has been deliberately avoiding security traditional issues such as the South China Seas and focused more on non-traditional issues. He concluded his presentation with the prospects for NSP sustainability after President Moon's administration.



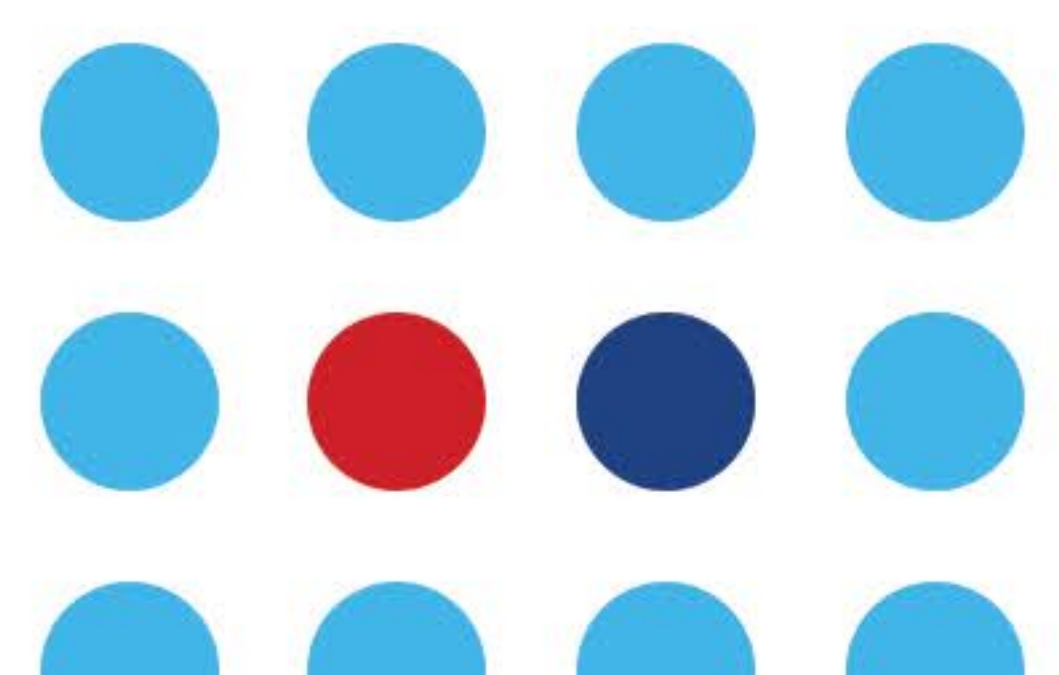
Afterward, Equilibrium Tampubolon, Amalia Mastur, and Angelo Abil Wijaya shared their policy recommendations and strategies to address some of the challenges in Indonesia-Korea relations. Under the People Pillar, Equilibrium Tampubolon described the policy proposal that includes protection of Indonesians and Koreans, especially in the healthcare sector, an increase of meaningful people-to-people interactions, and revival in the tourism sector. He further highlights the importance of practical cooperation to produce tangible development.



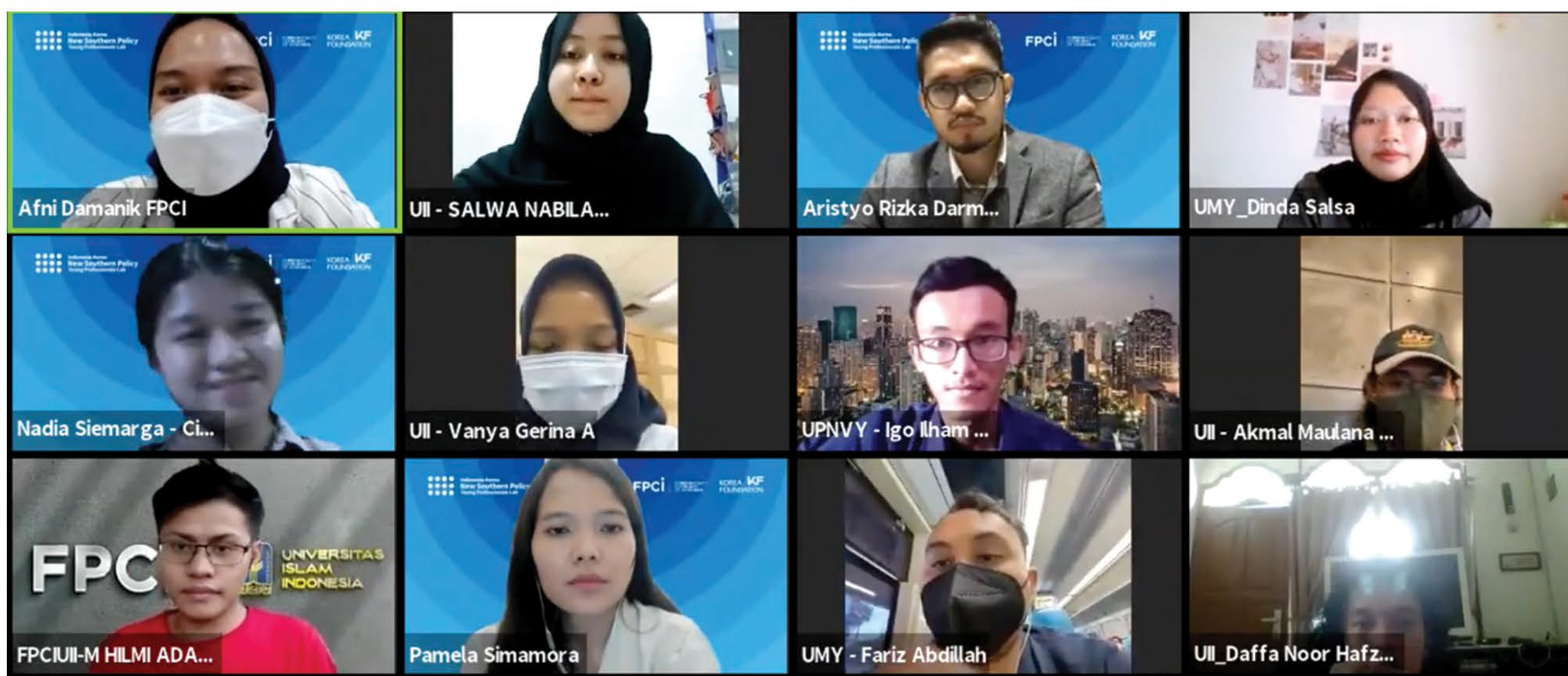
Amalia Mastur then continued the presentation on the Prosperity Pillar. She noted that the recommendations are aimed to `build back better` and that this term should include jargon that could be adapted by the NSP. She also suggested two policy recommendations including promotion of investment and trade for economic recovery, as well as addressing knowledge and economic gap between the two countries.



Angelo Abil Wijaya then presented the policy recommendations under the Peace Pillar that include defense industry and technology cooperation, as well as cooperation among maritime law enforcement agencies. He then emphasizes the importance of peacebuilding and the promotion of democratic values and the rule of law at the grassroots level. The forum is concluded with a question and answer session with the press and general public—three hundred and eighty-three people registered for the forum.



Special University Lecture with FPCI Chapters DI Yogyakarta
Wednesday, 16 June 2021



On Wednesday, 16 June 2021, Indonesia-Korea New Southern Policy Young Professionals Lab convened a Special University Lecture with FPCI Chapters DI Yogyakarta entitled “Unravelling Paths for a Stronger NSP Implementation After the Pandemic.” The Special University Lecture featured Nadia Caroline, Pamela Simamora, and Aristyo Rizka Darmawan as the keynote speakers. Ninety-seven students from three universities in Yogyakarta registered for the lecture.



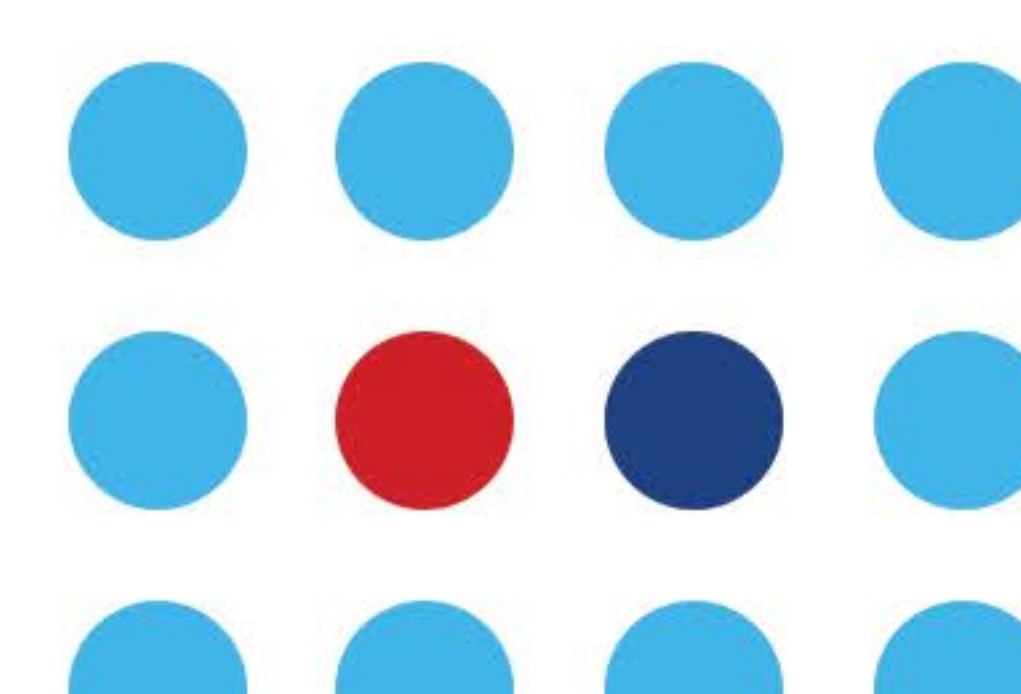
Nadia Caroline began the forum by briefly explaining the New Southern Policy and the perspectives behind creating the pillars, namely People, Prosperity, and Peace. She also briefly explained the evolution of NSP until the announcement of the NSP Plus. She emphasized that Indonesian nationals are the second largest in terms of migrant workers in Korea, making the Peace Pillars' recommendations need special attention. She said that people-to-people relations still could be bolstered via means such as TV shows and other digital platforms despite the pandemic.



Pamela Simamora focuses her presentation on the realities we face in the sustainable sector. Before presenting the policy recommendations under the Prosperity Pillar, she noted that the COVID-19 pandemic had affected the economy, society, and environment. Therefore the NSP has to find balance in all three sectors because of this causality. She hopes through Indonesia-Korea Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (IK-CEPA), Korean investment, especially in energy sustainability, IT, and digital infrastructure could increase.



Aristyo Rizka Darmawan, then presented the policy recommendations under Peace Pillar, explaining the importance of focusing not only on traditional but also non-traditional security issues. He claimed that both countries share the issue of illegal fishing. Both countries are also facing issues such as people smuggling, human trafficking, and more. Seeing this, Indonesia and Korea should reorient their strategic priorities through regional partnership implemented in practices of defense industry and technology cooperation, security dialogue, and capacity building program.

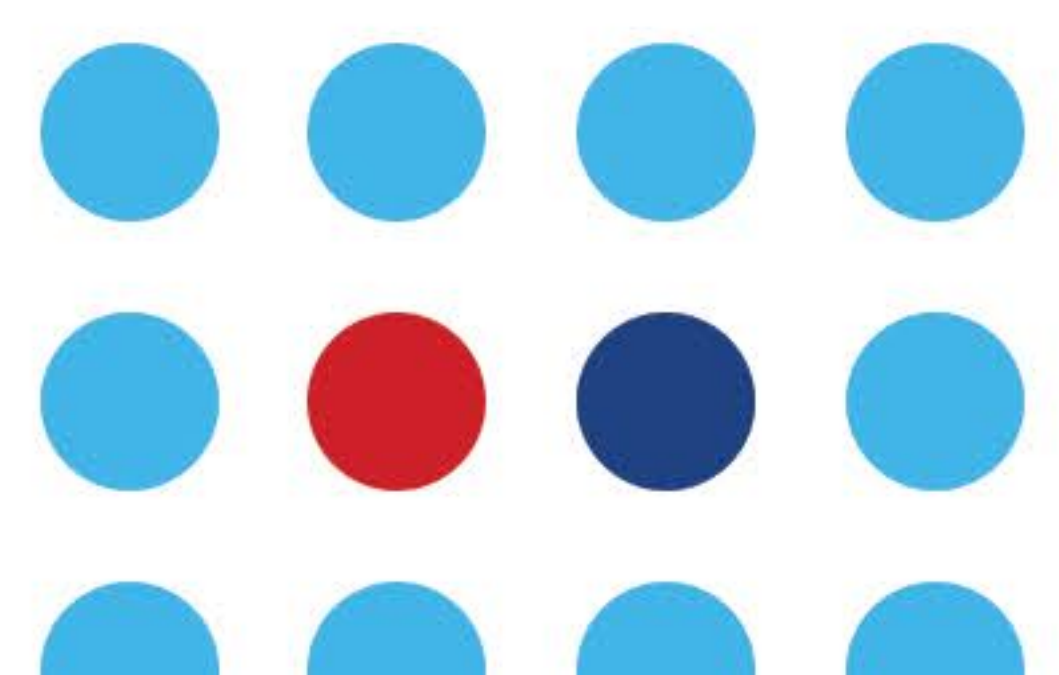

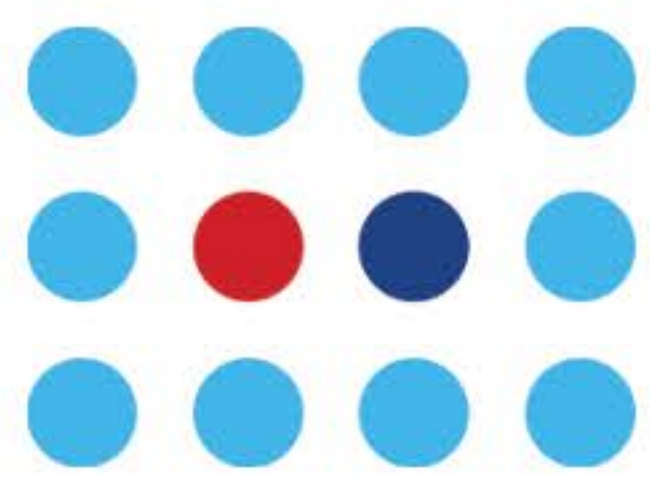
Dr. Dino Patti Djalal is a retired career diplomat; former Presidential spokesperson, speech writer and special staff; former Indonesia's Ambassador to the United States; youth activist; academic; author of a national best seller; and former Vice Minister for Foreign Affairs (2014). He is known in Indonesia as Presidential Spokesperson for President Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono – a position he held for 6 years from October 2004 to October 2010, which makes him the longest serving Presidential spokesperson in Indonesia's modern history. In 2015, he founded the Foreign Policy Community of Indonesia (FPCI), an independent non-government non-political non-partisan non-profit forum on international relations, which has grown to be the largest foreign policy group in Indonesia with around 100,000 people in their network. Dr. Djalal serves as the Chairman of the Indonesian Board of Director of the World Resources Institute Indonesia (WRI). He also served as special adviser to the Chairman of the Global Green Growth Institute which is an organization based in Seoul, Republic of Korea. He is the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Indonesian Diaspora Network Global (IDN-Global). In 2018, he was elected as Chairman of the Indonesian Lecturer Association. He obtained his Bachelor's Degree in Political Science from Carleton University (Ottawa, Canada) and his Masters Degree in Political Science from Simon Fraser University (British Columbia, Canada). In 2000, he received a Doctorate Degree from the London School of Economics and Political Science, after completing and defending a thesis on Preventive Diplomacy under the supervision of renowned scholar on Southeast Asia, the late Professor Michael Leifer.



Prof. Dewi Fortuna Anwar – Supervising Professor

Dewi Fortuna Anwar is an academican of the Indonesian Academy of Sciences (AIPI), a Research Professor at the Center for Political Studies-Indonesian Institute of Sciences (P2P-LIPI), Chairman of the Board of Directors of The Habibie Center (THC), and co-founder of the Foreign Policy Community of Indonesia (FPCI) based in Jakarta. In 2010-2017 Dewi served as a Deputy Secretary to the Vice President of the Republic of Indonesia. 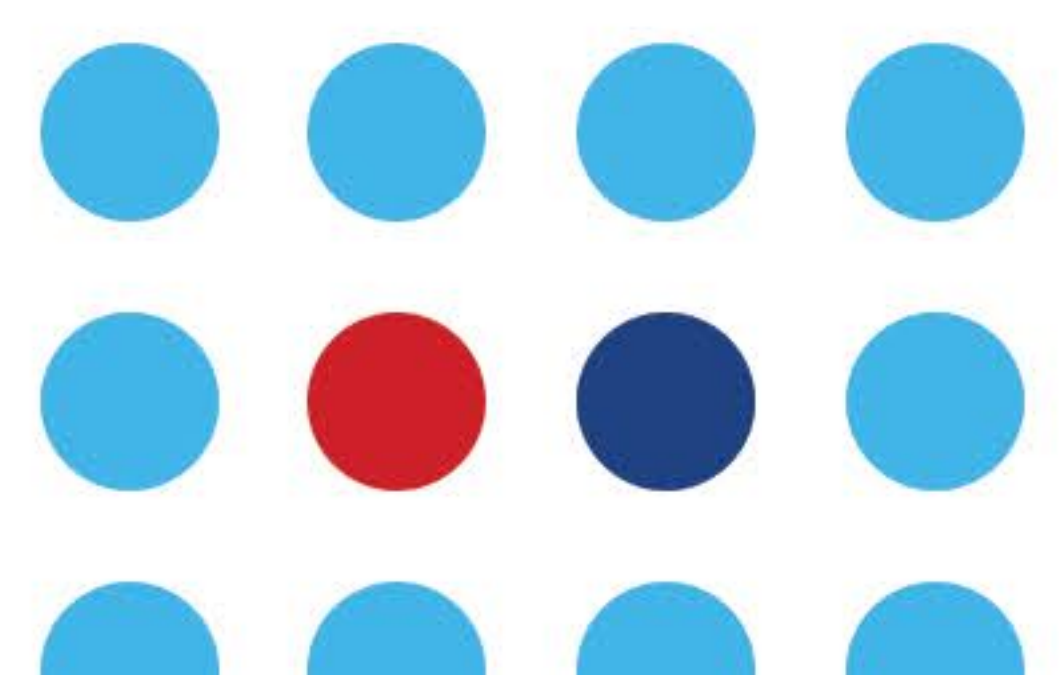
Mr. Jamil Maidan Flores – Senior Editor

Deputy Secretary-General for ASEAN Political Security Community, ASEAN

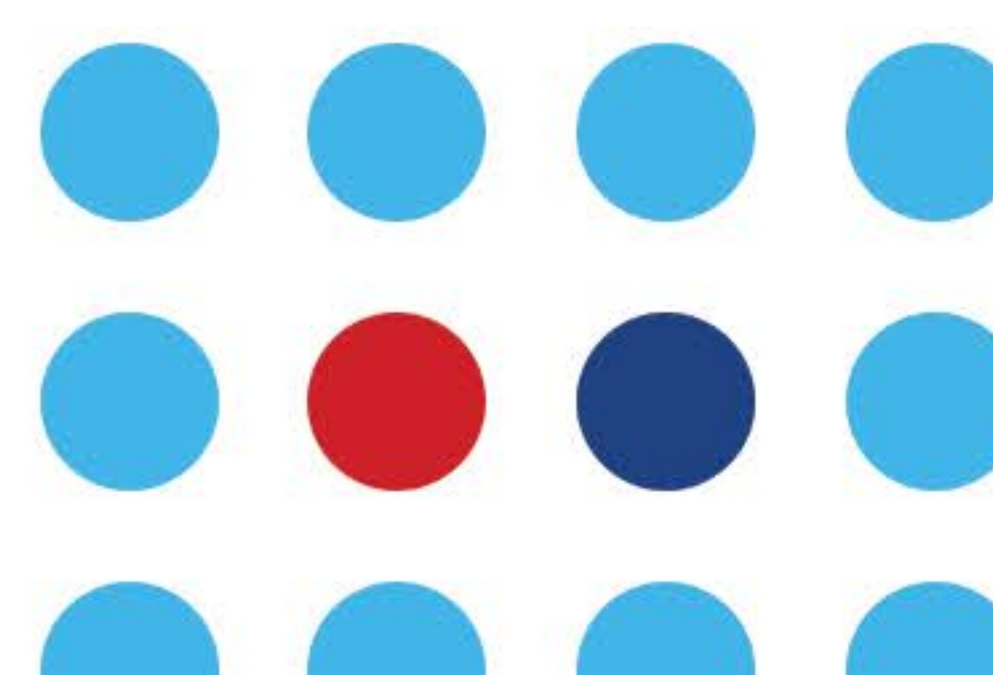

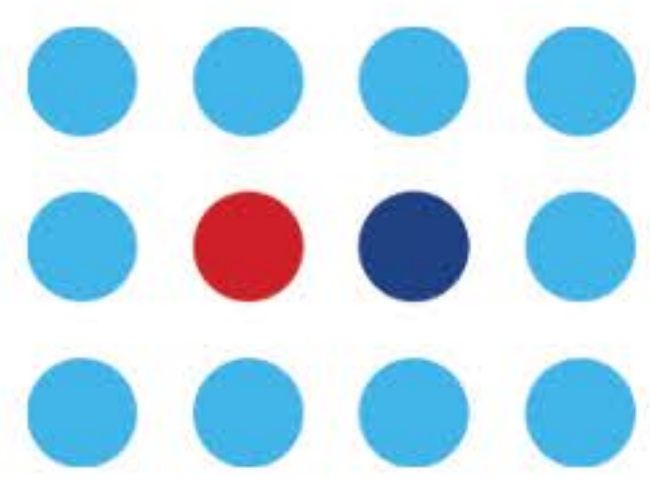


H.E. Thomas Lembong

Ambassador of the Republic of Korea to ASEAN

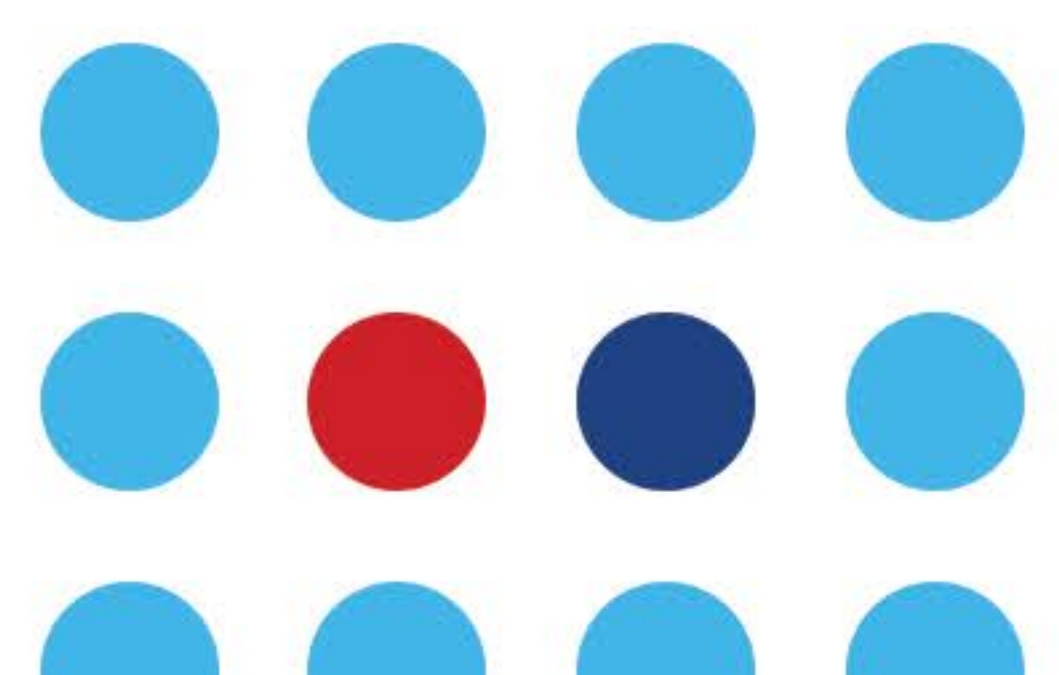

Ambassador of Indonesia to the Republic of Korea

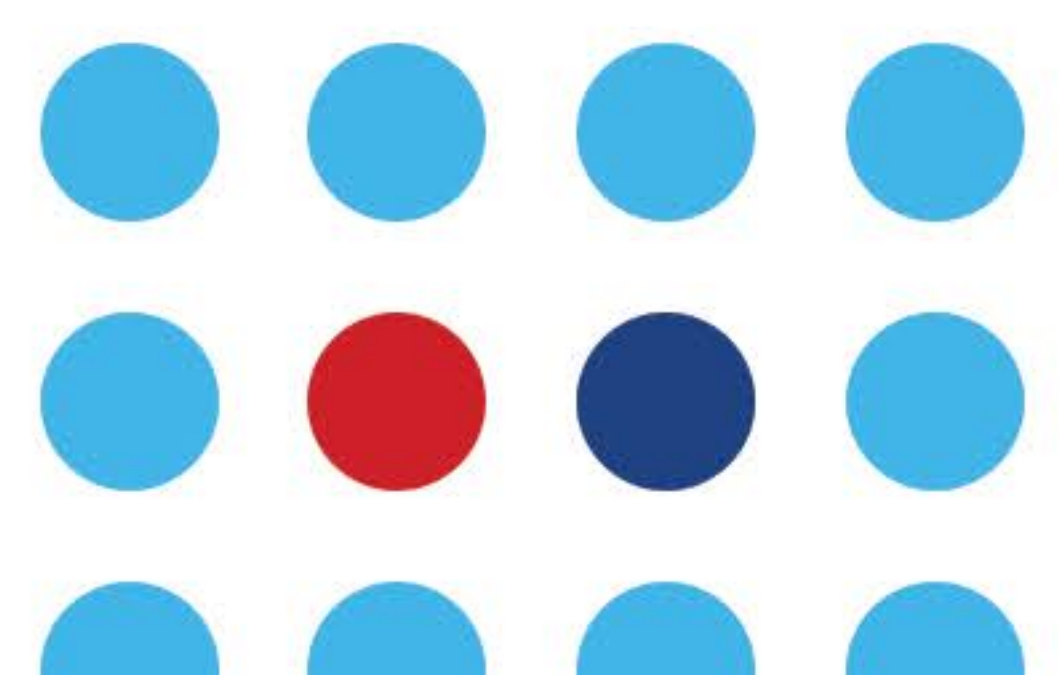

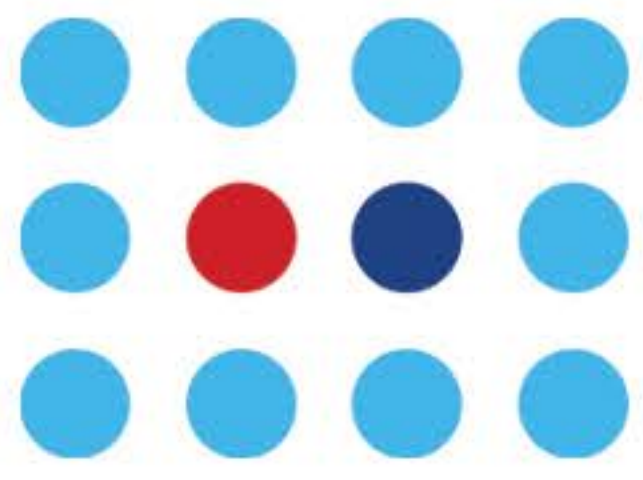


H.E. Abdul Kadir Jailani

Director for ASEAN Cooperation Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Republic of Korea

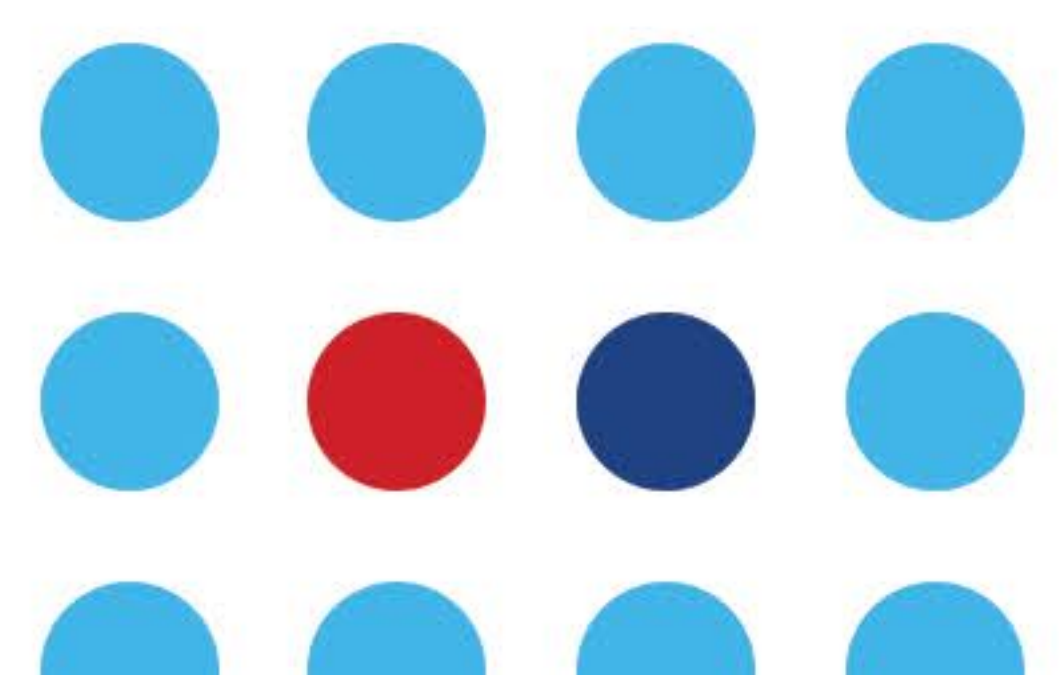

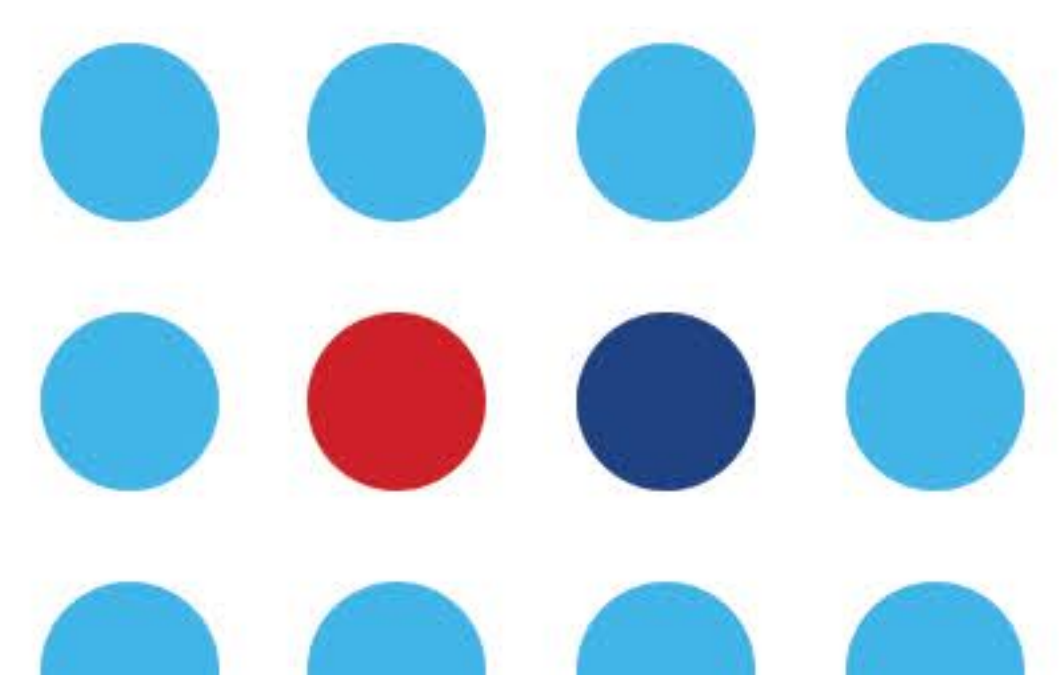

Director of Indonesia – Korea Business Cooperation Center, Korean Trade-Investment Promotion Agency (KOTRA) Jakarta

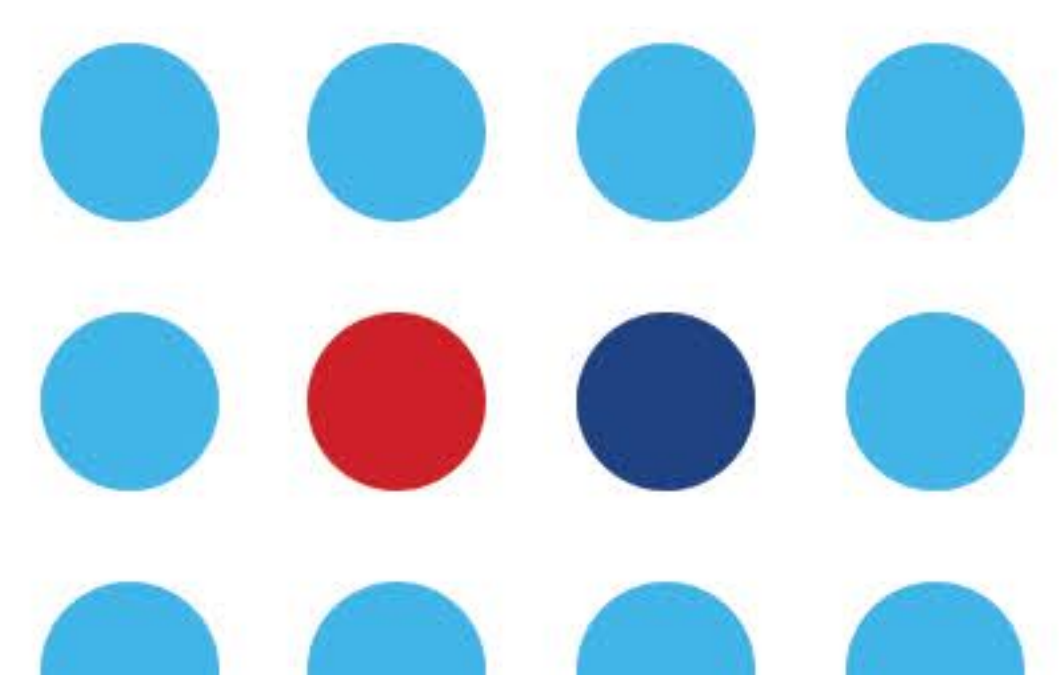

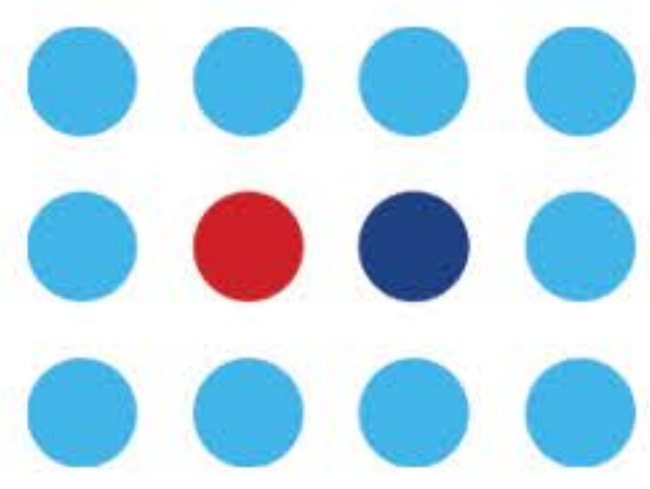


Mr. Lee Joochan

Deputy Head of Information and Data Unit, ASEAN-Korea Centre (AKC)

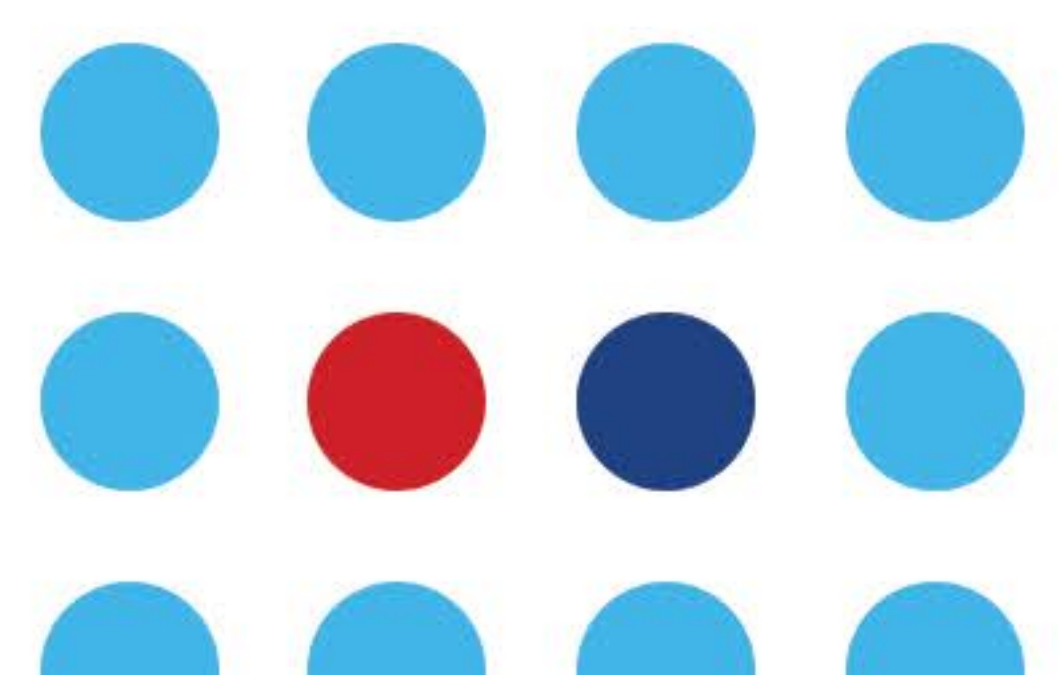

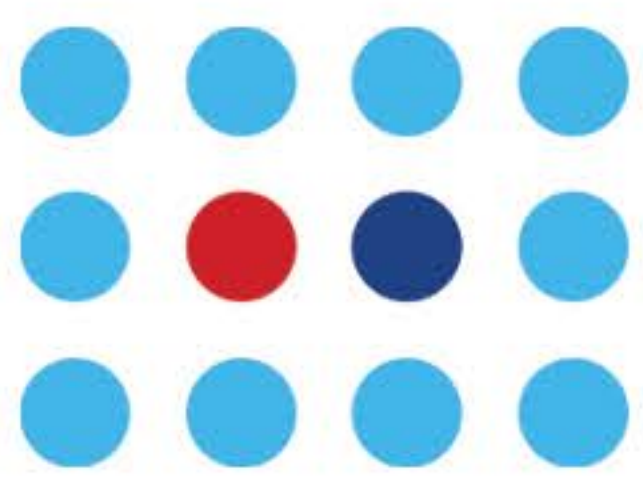


Prof. Choe Wongi

Research Fellow, Korea Institute for Economic Policy

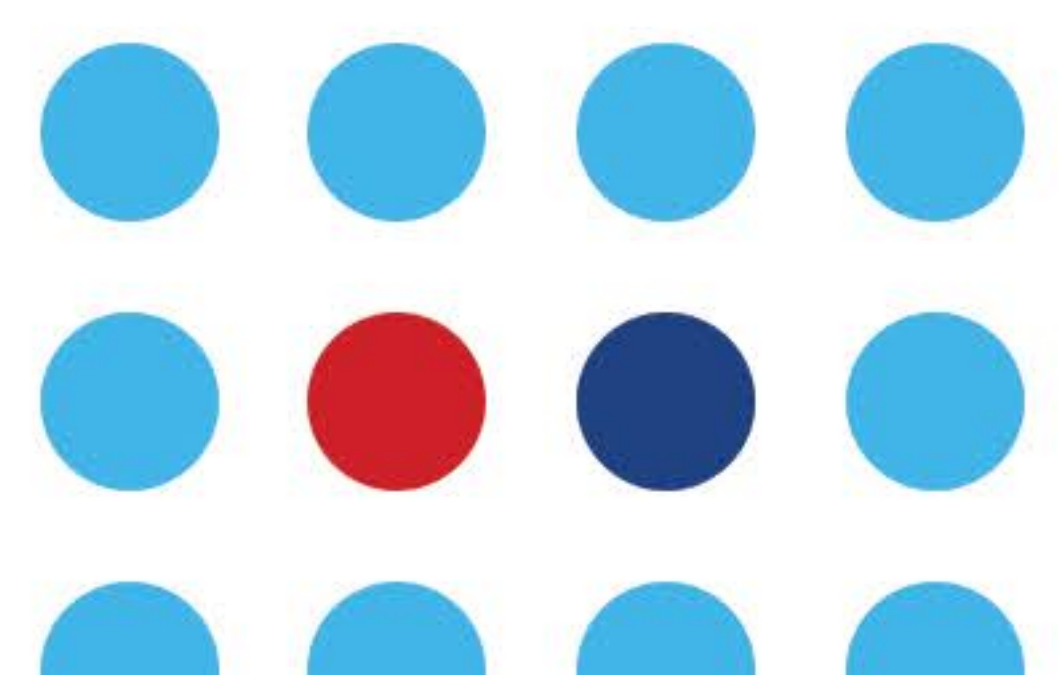

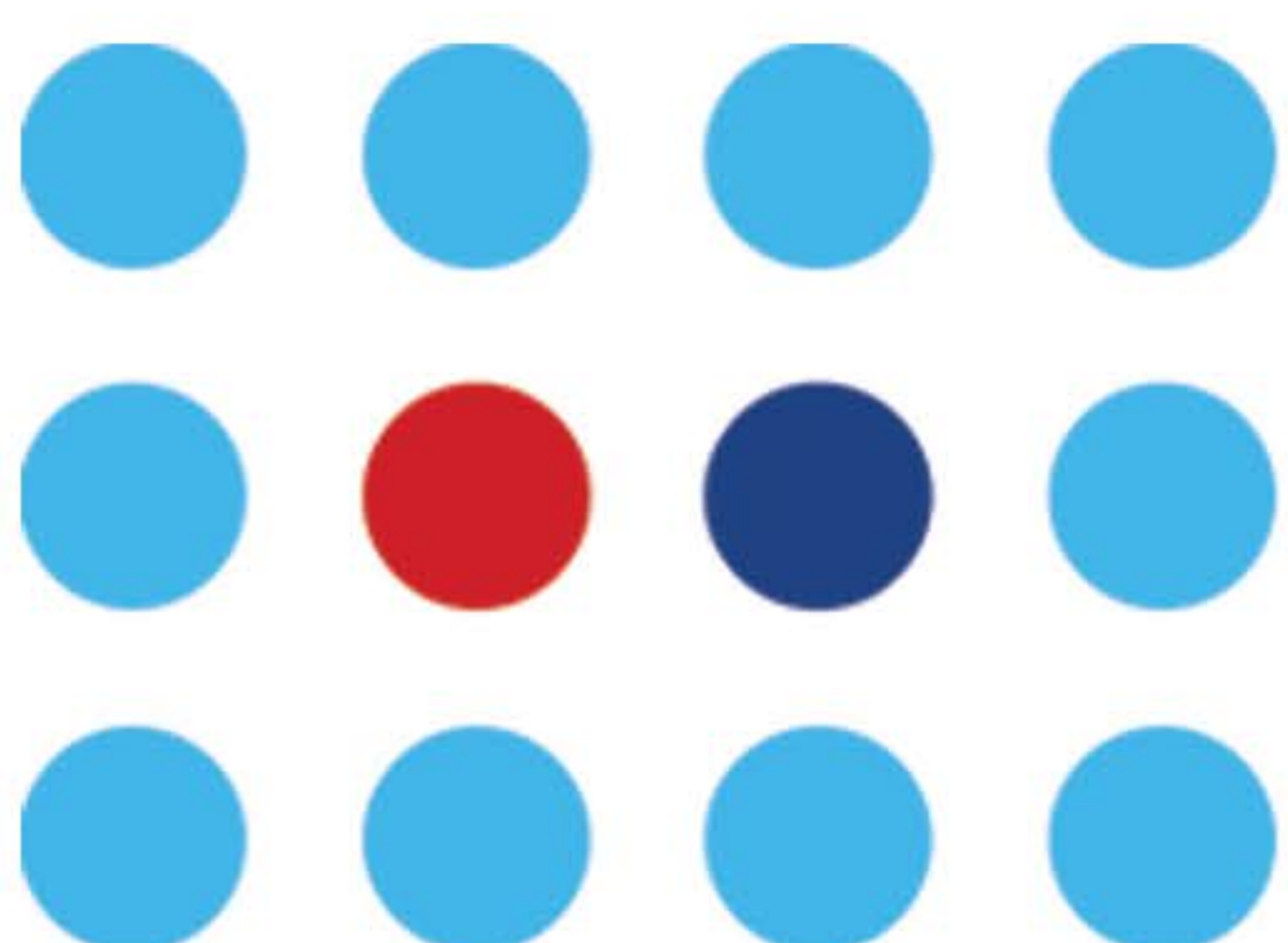
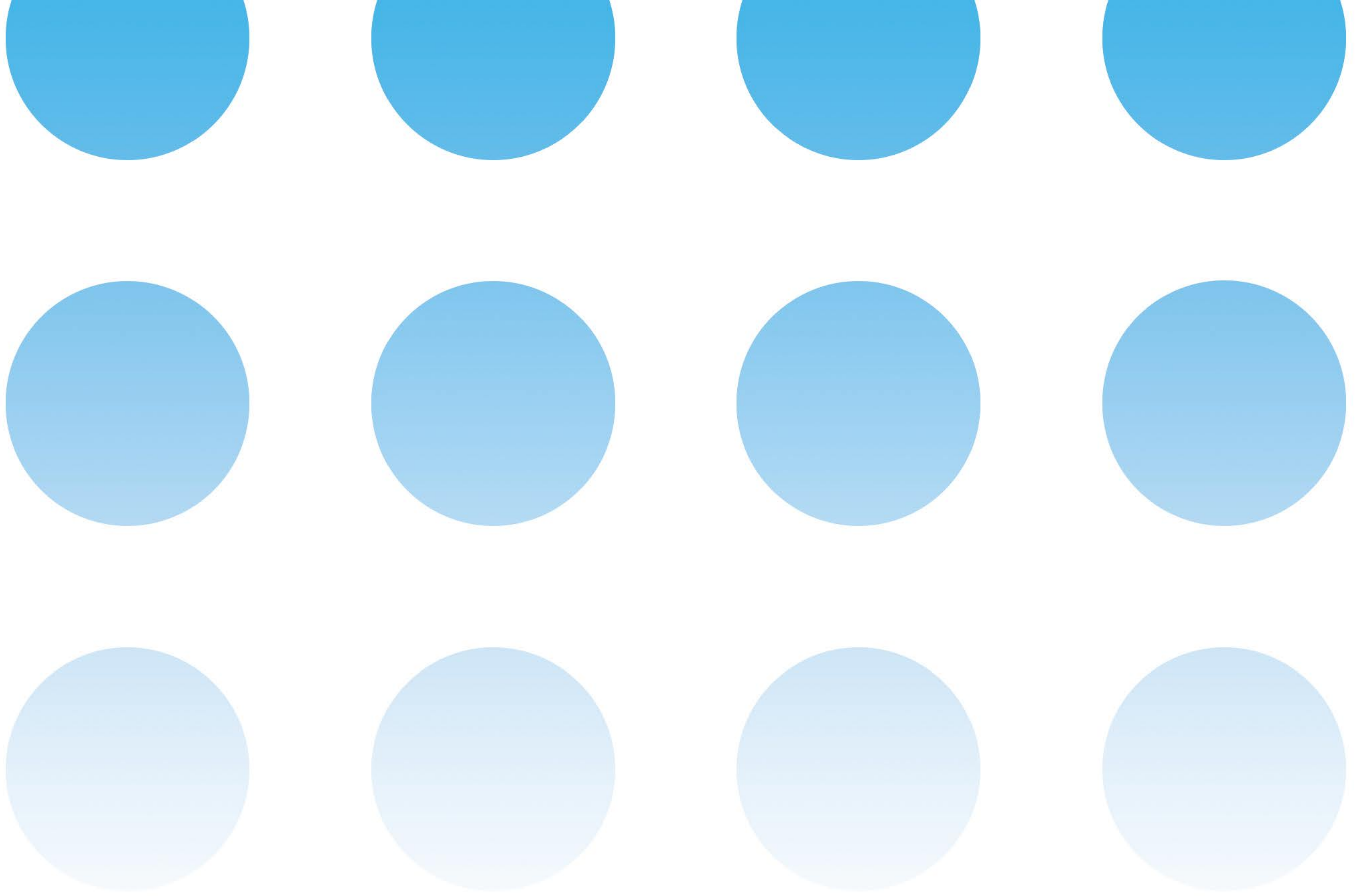


Dr. Lee Jaehyon

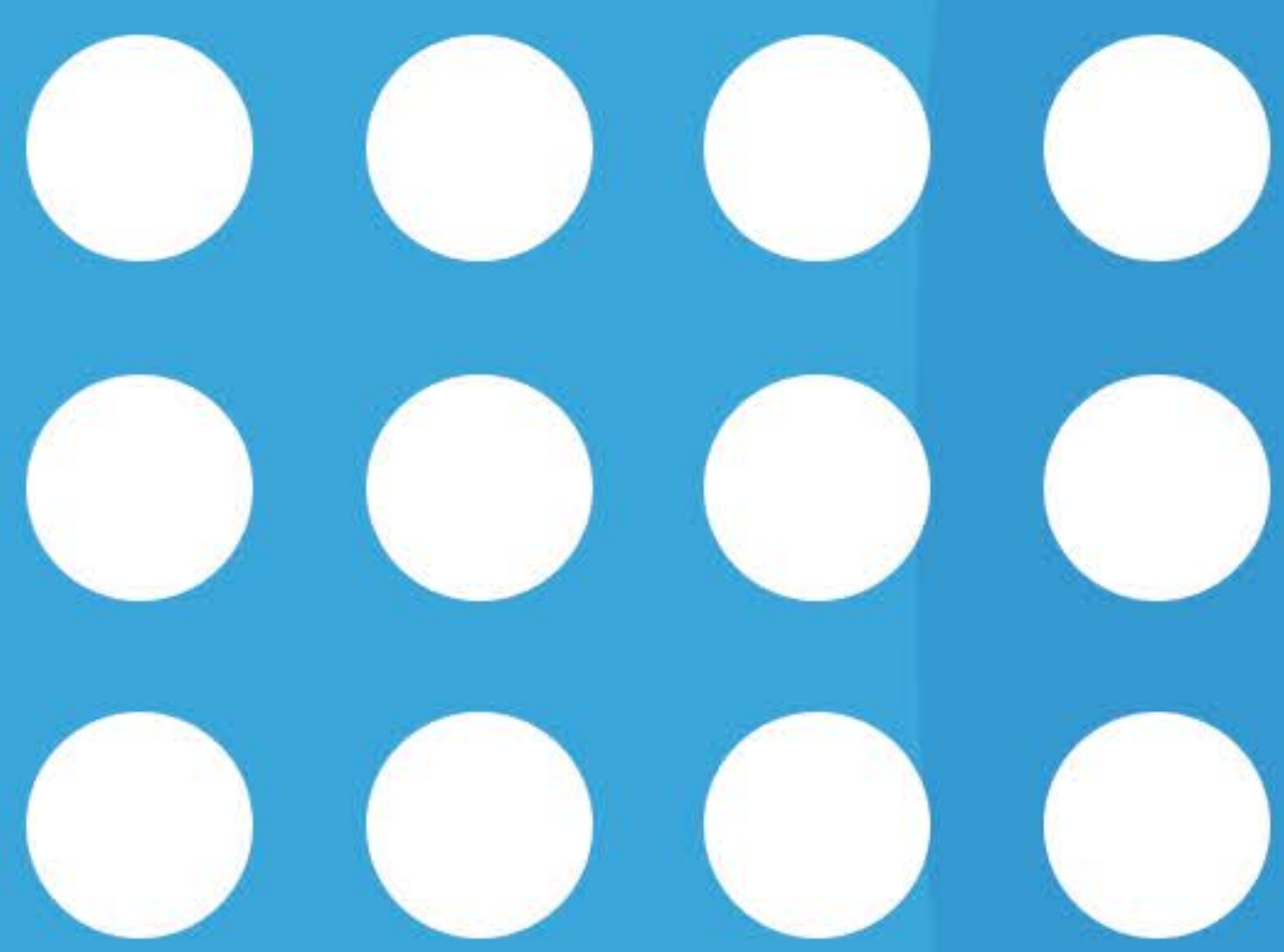
Senior Fellow, Asan Institute for Policy Studies
